COMMONS ELECTRIFIED

BY CHARGES AGAINST HON. A. B. MORINE.

Chairman of the Public Service Commission—F. B. Carvell, M.P. Made Some Sweeping Charges.

Ottawa, March 30.—Almost the last day of the first session of the twelfth parliament of Canada was enlivened, not to say electrified, by the utterance of F. B. Carvell, of Carleton, N.B., from his place in the house, of charges of the most sweeping and serious nature—against the personal and political honor of Hon. A. B. Morine, chairman of the public service commission.

Mr. Carvell went at length into Mr. Morine's political career in Newfoundland, stating that the latter had been twice dismissed from the premiership of that colony. The gravest charge against him, according to Mr. Carvell's statement, was that while a member of a cabinet he had handed over vast concessions to H. G. Reid, a well-known railway magnate. Mr. Morine had been in receipt of a salary as legal adviser to Mr. Reid, a position which he continued to hold even when he assumed Governor McCallum that honorific he had no connection with that gentleman.

Premier Borden was plainly surprised at the charges made by Mr. Carvell. He promised government consideration of them. He said that three years ago certain charges were made against Mr. Morine, by a resident of the United States, whose name the premier does not recall, who wrote "confidential" letters and who refused to allow Mr. Borden to lay the matter before Mr. Morine. Mr. Morine later issued a general denial of all charges of wrongdoing, anything that occurred, he said, could be justified on investigation.

GRAND OPERA HOUSE.

Quarter of Million Dollars.

We hear people speaking about Kingston taking a forward move. No doubt about it; property increasing in value; new streets opened and houses rapidly filling the same. The past fiscal year has shown the largest amount of business in the history of the city. The revenue from customs imports were \$250,580, or about \$28,000 more than the year when the national policy became law, when the merchants cleared their warehouses and made large importations in order to give the increased duty that would take effect under the N.P. The surplus revenue over last year amounts to over \$50,500.

The Kingston and Pembroke railway company will ask the railway commission next Tuesday for approval of plans showing the proposed alteration of the location of their station at Godfrey. There is also an application of the C.L.O. and W. railway respecting a proposed branch line that would cross the tracks of the K. & P. railway near Parham.

On State Occasions Only.

London, March 30.—The privy council issued an order that no member of that body shall wear his uniform except on state occasions. The order was the sequel to the appearance of Lord Advocate Eric of Scotland, at the Chelsea arts ball in the uniform of a privy councillor.

LIFE PRISONER ESCAPED FROM PENITENTIARY.

Chartrand is a man of medium weight, five feet nine inches in height, shallow complexion, grey eyes, brown hair, two scars below knee, and birth mark on back of thigh and leg. He is about forty years of age. This is the second time he has escaped from the insane ward of this prison, by exactly the same methods. Four or five years ago he was at large for a month or more when he was captured near Brockville. How long he will have his liberty this time is hard to say.

It is understood that Warden Platt offers \$50 reward for his recapture.

His Escape in 1906.

Joseph Chartrand escaped from the penitentiary on May 7th, 1906, and was caught at Yonge Mills bridge, twenty-three miles from the other side of Gananogue, by Gilbert J. Mallory, county constable of Mallorytown. Scarcely a week from the actual time of his escape from the penitentiary, he was returned to the hands of justice. The story of the capture is as simple as the catching of a runaway. He was seen by a constable while he was a lion tamed to lamb-like tenderness when brought to bay.

A strange man, answering the description of the escaped convict, called at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Davis, living three miles below Mallorytown, and asked for something to eat. His strange demeanor caused attention and County Constable Mallory was at once notified. But the stranger finished his lunch, and departed, before the county constable arrived on the scene. The county constable took up the "trail," and followed for two or three miles. A man answering the description of the one who visited Mr. Davis was located at the home of Benjamin Eyres. As Constable Mallory drove up he was talking to Mr. Eyres. Constable Mallory said: "I guess you are the man I want." Chartrand pleaded ignorance of everything, but made no attempt to escape. Acting quickly, Constable Mallory lifted the trouser leg of the man and immediately recognized the birth mark on the leg of which he had read a description of in the British Whig. The constable then pulled out his handcuffs and snapped them on him and he was soon back in his cell at the penitentiary.

Condemned to Die.

Chartrand was given a life sentence at Sault Ste. Marie for shooting a detective who sought to arrest him for some minor offence. He was sentenced to be hanged, but on the evidence of doctors, who reported that he was insane, he was given life imprisonment. After the shooting Chartrand was nursed for two weeks, and was found in the woods, eating the remains of a dead rabbit. He was nearly starved.

WOULD COMMANDEER ALL COAL.

En Route to Canada if Strike Breaks Out.

Toronto, March 30.—A canvass of the large local coal yards, this morning, reveal the fact that there is no more than a week's supply of hard and soft coal on hand here or known to be in transit. If a strike occurs in the coal fields of Pennsylvania and Ohio next week, there will be nothing to spare for the outside cities and towns of Ontario. It is learned by wire from representative places in both Eastern and Western Ontario that most of the coal distributing points in Ontario are in a similar position.

Coal dealers here fear that the first move of the United States officials, if a strike is declared, will be to perpetually commandeer all Canadian coal in transit on that side of the border, and hold it for United States use. This would be quite according to international law and precedent.
