A MOST SEVERE BLOW BECK'S POWER OFFER

AGAINST HONESTY OF BORDEN GOVERNMENT.

Belieux and Carvell May Repeat Their Charges Against Morine and Decharme Outside the Commons.

Ottawa, April 1.—Although the cabinet has not yet had time formally to consider the charges made by Mr. Carvell in the commons on Friday against the public and private character of A. B. Morine, chairman of the public inquiries commission, and Mr. Morine's reply thereto, the whole episode is looked upon as perhaps the severest blow of the session, at the honesty, respectability and political good faith of the government. The importance of the commission's task in reporting generally on measures for the general improvement of the governmental services, and on the past administration of the late government demanded the appointment of commissioners of unimpeachable character.

The charges of Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux and Mr. Carvell in the commons against Commissioners Ducharme and Morine are of the gravest kind, and will be repeated if necessary outside the walls of parliament, where "privileges" cannot be used as a defence against libel actions.

PROROGUE PARLIAMENT ON MONDAY AFTERNOON

The Final Sitting Was Held on Monday Morning With Slim Attendance.

Ottawa, April 1.—There was a very slim attendance of members in the commons, this morning, when the house assembled for the final sitting of this session, only between forty and fifty being present. The speaker received a letter from Col. H. C. Lowther, military secretary, informing the house that prorogation would take place at four o'clock.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Cuffed From All Over the World.

The Grand Trunk railway stated that there was enough coal on the track to last well into summer.

Somator Gore, of Oklahoma, narrowly escaped death, when a crazed Pole, Charles Schomulla, attacked him with a club.

An increase of approximately \$15,000,000 will be shown in the final return of customs receipts for the fiscal year just closed.

The minister of railways and canals has finally determined upon the route for the enlarged Welland canal. It is what is known as the Ten Mile Creek route.

Two artists, Robert L. Newman and Miss Louise Schofield, were found dead in their studios in New York, on Sunday, having been asphyxiated by gas from a heater.

The body of a child could not be received for burial at Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Toronto, Sunday, because the nine grave-diggers there were on strike. The body was accepted at St. James' cemetery.

The federal parliament was prorogued on Monday by the governor-general. The tariff commission and highway bills have been dropped as government would not accept the senate's amendments.

At New York on Saturday night, Quail, of Alexandria Bay, N.Y., won the one-hour professional running race. He covered 11 miles and 700 yards.

Wood, Canadian, was second, and Ied Crooks, of Fall River, Mass., third. St. Yves and Trent were also among the starters, quitting early in the contest. Longboat did not start.

Representatives of carmen, telegraph operators, dispatchers, signal men, track men, clerks and agents employed by many eastern railroads, met in New York on Sunday and declared that their claims for better pay should be considered before the railroads granted further increases to their higher salaried employees.

Opening Mines in Barrie.

The Ore Chimney Mining company has property in the township of Barrie, said to be a first-class proposition. Its holdings are some three hundred acres of high grade land, where it is said gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc have been found. The development work is being pushed by experienced men under the direction of J. A. Jamieson, a prominent engineer.

Demonstrates His Expulsion.

Duver, Col., April 1.—The socialist organization of Bridgeport, Conn., has demanded that the local organization immediately expel William D. Haywood, former secretary of the federal miners, on charges of duplicity and double-dealing in connection with the Lawrence strike and other labor troubles.

Minister Reid will leave in a few days for New York where he will take a course in one of the finishing schools in that city.

TO BE CONSIDERED BY UTILITIES COMMITTEE.

It Has Not Yet Been Announced—The Commission Will Not Buy Out the Seymour Company.

This afternoon the civic utilities committee will deal with the power question once more. At its last meeting it instructed the manager to bring down a summary of the correspondence with the Seymour company and the Hydro-electric commission, with a view to entering into a contract at once. A week ago Ald. Rigney received from the Hydro-Electric commission a contract with which Hon. Adam Beck would like to enter into with the city with power from Waddington, N.Y. The Seymour company will also have its representatives present at the meeting. The Hydro-Electric contract terms will not be announced till the committee meets this afternoon.

The intention of Mr. Beck is to give the eastern municipalities power from Waddington until the Chats Falls are developed, and then to connect with the latter source. The latest information is that the commission has dropped its intention of buying out the business of the Seymour company, which operates the Trent supply, and will confine itself in the east to the falls at Waddington and Chats Falls, near Ottawa.

SALE WAS STOPPED.

A howl in the conservative camp met Saturday morning had the effect of stopping an advertised sale of ten military horses, which was to have taken place by auction, at noon, that morning. R. W. Allen was to have sold the animals, but objection was raised, as it appears Mr. Allen is a liberal. It is likely the sale will be held next Saturday morning, and the auctioneer will either be W. C. Martin or J. E. Jones.

A Montreal Street Fight.

Two young men from Barrieffield drew the attention of a crowd on Montreal street, on Saturday evening, about eight o'clock. They were in the shoe shining parlor on the corner of Montreal and Princess streets, when some difference brought on a quarrel and they went over Montreal street to fight it out. Their fists flew for a while, and one of the windows of the Deering machinery store was smashed. The combatants were finally separated by some of their friends.

At the Police Court.

Thomas Williams has only been in the city a short time, just a week or so, but he has spent a good deal of time at the police station. Two or three nights he went to the police station of his own accord, seeking shelter, but Saturday night he was gathered in as a drunk. He was the only offender in the police court on Monday morning and the magistrate imposed a fine of \$1 and costs, or twenty days.

Thief Still at Large.

The man who broke into Z. Prevost's clothing store, Brock street, is still at large. Mr. Prevost says that the thief got into almost everything. He is continually running across goods that have been meddled with so that he cannot estimate his loss without going through the whole stock. He thinks the man got away with between one and two hundred dollars worth.

In Trouble Again.

A man supposed to be John Murphy, of Hamilton, a burglar and bank robber, out of the penitentiary but a short time, is under arrest in London, charged with vagrancy, and held in connection with the blowing up of the safe at the Arva roller mills.

Few Contagious Cases.

During the past week there were reported to the medical health officer two cases of typhoid fever and one case of chicken-pox. One of the typhoid cases originated outside the city, the patient having come here from Porcupine.
