**THE SPORT REVIEW**

**THE CLEVELAND HOCKEY TEAM PLAY VERY RAPIDLY.**

And the Kingston Team was Given No Protection by the Referee in the First Game—Crawford Was Missed.  
 Certainly the trip of the all-stars hockey team to Cleveland finished the season for this season. The team has reason to feel that their trip into Uncle Sam's country was a decided success. There is little doubt that the Kingston seven would have beaten the team Friday night if they had not gone on the ice in a tired condition, and their opponents had been made to play hockey. Kingston team, as a whole, never have been "smashers," but always play the game. A travel agent, who saw both games, told the Whig that the first was something "in a class" in this respect, and very often the Kingston—chaps—recognized, "If any man hit you on the right cheek, turn the left to him, and return some of the smashing." Kingston had the sympathy of half the enormous crowd who hissed the referee.  
 However, the all-stars went on the ice Saturday night, with a change of referee and a judge of play, and, though this exhibition also savored some of roughness, it was kept well in hand. The Kingston team soon discouraged that over-confidence on the part of the Cleveland team, and gave the champions of the United States the tightest "race for their money" they ever ran up against, and this with some of Dr. Hanley's team injured. Some of them arrived in the city badly used up, but all having only the best to say for the hospitality of the Cleveland people.  
 The Kingston team, missed Crawford, who was unable to accompany them. Had he been on the win, the locals would have had their full scoring outfit and Cleveland's team of Canadians would have been defeated quite handily.

**PITH OF THE NEWS.**

**The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.**

Mayor T. F. Best, Niagara-on-the-Lake, died rather suddenly.  
 The Ogive elevator and warehouse at Marlen, Man., were destroyed by fire.  
 The pope has written a Latin anti-phon which the Abbe Perosi has set to music.  
 A large home rule demonstration took place in Dublin at which John Redmond spoke.  
 The Madero government is preparing for a formidable campaign against the rebels in Mexico.  
 John Elliott, found starving in an attic room, in Toronto, died at St. Michael's hospital.  
 It is again asserted that Gen. Weyler will soon be in supreme command of the Spanish operations in Morocco.  
 William Sloan, a United States army veteran, committed suicide at Holland Landing by swallowing poison in the cemetery.  
 A white man and a negro fought a street duel in Atchison, Kansas, on Saturday, resulting, white man killed, negro mortally wounded.  
 Grace Bryce, an English girl, who disappeared from her home in Winnipeg, was found dead in a scrub in the south end of that city.  
 It is reported that 4,000 construction men on the C.N.R., in British Columbia, went out on strike on Saturday. They want higher pay.  
 Rev. A. B. Erace, Almonte, announced his resignation, to take effect the end of April. It is understood he will accept a call to Dunnville Baptist church.

The wolves around the Port Arthur district are starving, and as a consequence are getting very bold, coming right up to the houses of the farmers. They hunt in packs of fifteen or more.  
 Edward Burnett, who was to have been electrocuted to-day, at Auburn, N.Y., was reprieved, on Saturday, by Governor Dix. Invitations to witness the execution had already been sent out.

The Winnipeg business men who proposed visiting Great Britain for the purpose of stimulating trade with that country, won't go on account of the coal strike. They are going to the Pacific coast instead, returning via St. Paul.

The Terra Nova, Captain Scott's ship, reached New Zealand, bringing word that the British explorer on January 3rd was 150 miles from the south pole and still advancing. Capt. Scott also intimated his intention of wintering in the Antarctic.

Miss Lucille Pugh, a New York lawyer, who wears a swallow-tail coat and derby hat, was assigned by Judge Swan, on Saturday, to defend LeRoy Pointexter, a negro, charged with murdering a white man on the 7th of March, in New York city.

The C.N.R. Construction company, whose office at Perth Road was recently destroyed by fire, have adapted a shack to their purpose and have their stores there. The work has not been held up by the mishap, although it caused the men considerable inconvenience.

**TRADEMARK SACRED.**

**The Court Upholds Owners of Trade-mark Name.**

The value of advertising, especially to manufacturers, was never more clearly shown than in the decision of Justice Charbonneau, in the district court of Montreal. A few days ago a new retail firm, with the word "vibe-erg" as a part of their firm name, in inaugurating its advertising campaign, caused to be inserted in two Montreal papers large advertisements, the most prominent features of which were the words "Progress Proclaimed." Messrs. H. Vineberg & Co., Limited, proprietors of "Progress Brand Clothing," immediately made application for an injunction restraining this retail firm from using, for publicity purposes, the word "Progress."  
 H. Vineberg & Co., Limited, claimed that the use of the word "Progress," especially in connection with the name Vineberg, was calculated to mislead the public into believing that the new arrival was somehow or other connected with the older firm of the same name. As a matter of fact, such an impression was created among the customers of the petitioner, several enquiries being made asking whether the petitioner had decided to enter the retail field. As the ethics of the wholesale business precludes this possibility, except at the risk of losing all its clientele, the injury brought about by the false impression which had gained currency might have been incalculable.

Vineberg & Co., Limited, have made a specialty of their "Progress Brand" clothing, which has been so widely advertised as to be sold to the trade in practically every town as well as city in Canada, the application for injunction was not opposed and judgment was rendered in default, his lordship making the injunction so far-reaching that the respondent, as well as the newspapers figuring in the case, are forbidden to publish any advertising material for respondent in which the word "Progress" is found.
