FALL CAUSES DEATH

OF MICHAEL DOYLE, FARMER, OF WOLFE ISLAND.

Deceased Fell on Clarence Street Thursday Afternoon and Fractured His Skull—He Was Well Known Islander.

Michael Doyle, of Wolfe Island, who was injured by falling on the sidewalk in front of the Queen City Oil company's office on Clarence street, on Thursday afternoon, at three o'clock, died in the Hotel Dieu on Friday night at about eleven o'clock. His skull had been fractured.

The deceased was born at Millan's Bay and had lived on the island for twenty-nine years, and had farmed there all the time. Mr. Doyle was very much respected by his many friends and the news of his sudden death will be a great shock to them. In religion he was a Roman Catholic. He is survived by his wife, three daughters and five sons; Louis, Lloyd, Lionel and Lawrence, at home and Leo, of Watertown; Mrs. Cane, of Wolfe Island; Mrs. Edward White, of Watertown, and Irene at home. The remains were removed to the family home on the island, Saturday.


