PROF. KIRKPATRICK BELIEVES

That Car Ferry Can Navigate Straits at P.E.I.

A despatch from Charlottetown, P. E.I., says: Prof. A. K. Kirkpatrick, of the School of Mining, Kingston, arrived on the island on Wednesday, to continue his investigation on behalf of the Dominion government to determine the best route for the proposed car ferry between the island and the mainland. He has been on the mainland for the past ten days, visiting Richibucto, Beale and Pictou, and will visit Summerside, West Cape and other points on the island this week. On previous trips a month ago he took in Charlottetown, Carleton, Tormentine and other points, examining the ice conditions. He believes it possible, with a car ferry service of proper design and strength to navigate the Straits all winter. He has had considerable experience with the ice on the great lakes, having built piers for a car ferry at Port Burwell and Port Stanley on Lake Erie.
