**The Man On Watch**

The Tories have reason to be some what sore when the critics are picking all the government contract plums to be had, the Lammman remarks. It would have been a mortal sin, to be sure, to have allowed that auction sale of horses to proceed last Saturday without a Tory wielding the hammer. The Lammman is told that the critics have become so used to tendering on government requirements that they know the "game" thoroughly. The late grit government was so stingy that a very small margin of profit was given on any contract. Perhaps the present government will be more generous to the "faithful" since it came into office and allow more liberal profits.

It amused the Lammman to hear some uneducated and uncultured people—from an outside town of course—criticize the Scotch comedy at Branigan's playhouse last week. "Stung" was their lament at paying out their dollar to witness the production that ranks as one of the best national character plays ever seen on the stage.

The "Chocolate Soldier" was so much better, one of these critics declared. This comparison was akin to comparing a dog with a horse—each belonging to a different class. The Lammman thought that in this enlightened age, people could appreciate the underlying meaning of at least some of the apparently commonplace Scotch sayings, but evidently the comedy and its humor was too subtle for a section of the "patrons of music and drama."

The Lammman agrees with the lady who has written him on the subject that too many dogs are allowed to roam the streets of Kingston. Only a few days ago, a girl was bitten by a King street canine that should have known better. The only hope for the destruction of a few hundred of these useless animals is a rabies scare. For one thing there are too many bull dogs roaming the highways of the town. The Lammman would favor the increase of the tax on dogs to five dollars a year. That would yield the town council an additional revenue of perhaps three thousand dollars.

Father Jones, of Toronto, seems to think that the census of Kingston would be very considerably reduced if those guilty of the seventh commandment met the punishment administered ancient Israel. The Lammman refuses to believe that Kingston is so so as the reverend Father hinted at in his address in St. Mary's cathedral last Tuesday evening. If it was, the population might not be so materially affected, even if the old stoning law was on the Ontario statute books, because who then would cast the first stone?

The Lammman regrets to note the retirement from the Canadian senate of the Hon. Michael Sullivan, of Kingston town. There was no more useful senator in Canada's "lords" than Dr. Sullivan, whose speeches were full of sound sense. The doctor, enfeebled in the evening of his life, has rendered to his town and his country years of faithful service.

The exhortation given by the missionary at St. George's the other day to the people not to waste the time of the clergy by drawing them into social affairs, was a timely one, the Lammman thinks. There is no doubt that clergymen are pestered by social demands, which take them away too much from the quiet atmosphere of ministerial work, and also serve to put a curb on their tongues in the way of denouncing social evils, although the Lammman recalls one local cleric who got up in his pulpit and denounced bridge parties and gambling by the ladies, and he had first hand information, too.
