## AN INDUSTRIAL FARM FEES STANDARDIZED

FOR THE EMPLOYMENT OF PRISONERS AT JAIL. AT MEETING OF KINGSTON MEDICAL ASSOCIATION.

Ald. Ross Sets Forth Scheme at Meeting of the City Council—Will Ask That Finance Committee Take Up Matter With the County

That the finance committee of the city council consider a plan with the county council as to the advisability of securing an industrial farm where men confined to the common jail on minor offences might be employed, is a scheme which Ald. Ross brought forward at the city council on Monday night. He took up the matter in the form of a notice of motion and will move to this effect at the next meeting of the council. He regards the plan as a good one and will put forth every effort to have it carried out.

Ald. Ross, in giving an explanation of his scheme, pointed out that nowadays great changes were being made as regards the confinement of prisoners in jail. In the present age all the attention was not given to merely keeping the prisoners within the big walls of a prison, feeding them on bread and water, and as regards work, calling upon them to carry wood from one side of the jail wall to the other one day and then the next day have them carry it back to the other side. Toronto, he pointed out, had been taking the lead as regards branching out into a better scheme. Statistics would go to show that ninety per cent. of those in the jail were unfortunate who had been arrested for being drunk, and who had been unable to pay their fine.

Ald. Ross said that this scheme, of course, would not apply to prisoners in jail on serious charges, for instance in the case of a murder charge when a person had to be closely guarded. All this, of course, could be provided for. The matter will, no doubt, bring forth an interesting discussion at the council when it comes up in the form of a resolution.

### FOR HARBOR IMPROVEMENTS.

Ald. Shaw Asked for Information at Council Meeting.

At the meeting of the city council, on Monday evening, Ald. Shaw, in view of the by-law passed to purchase the Cataract bridge, wanted to know if the special committee had acted as regards the harbor improvements in the way of dredging. He was anxious that the matter be proposed with as soon as possible, and that there should be no time lost.

Mayor Hoag stated that, with Dr. E. Ryan, president of the board of trade, he had waited upon W. F. Nickle, M.P. The matter had now reached the stage that it has gone into the hands of the city solicitor, and afterwards it would be necessary for a deputation from the board of trade and the finance committee to interview Hon. F. D. Monk, minister of public works.

Ald. Shaw wanted to know if there had been any planning as to where the bridge should be located. The mayor replied that all these matters would be worked out in the plans.

### BUSY AT DAVIS DRYDOCK.

There is a Steady Demand for Gasoline Engines.

With the approach of spring and the opening of navigation, things at Davis' dry dock are taking on quite a sanguine appearance. Work is going forward at the double quick march and the men work better when the spring atmosphere gets into their blood. The main feature of the work just now seems to be the steadily increasing demand for gasoline engines, of which a large number have been turned out or are still under construction.

The Davis company expects shortly to close another contract for a cruising pleasure craft. Fifty feet long, two feet beam and drawing about three feet of water, capable of developing a speed of from twelve to fifteen miles an hour. The boat is to be used in the vicinity of Montreal.

### ORPHAN SCHOOLS IN INDIA.

Address to Sydenham Street Methodist Epworth League.

Mrs. M. Campbell, missionary on furlough from India, addressed the young people of the Epworth League of Sydenham street church, on Monday evening, on the work of the orphan schools in India, especially the girls' schools. The address was most interesting and gave a most adequate idea of the difficulties encountered in that country as well as the blessed results of the labor.

After the regular part of the meeting the committee on the entertainment had a session in which names were proposed to take part in the play which will be put on. It was also decided to get right to work on the play and put it through as soon as possible.

### Montreal's Kingston Old Boys.

The Kingston old boys, in Montreal, will hold their annual dinner on Friday, April 19th. Hugh C. Walkem, the secretary of the association, is very anxious to hear from any of the old Kingston boys who are not members of the association, so that they can be put on the list. The dinner will be held at the Engineer's Club, and a fine time is being looked forward to.

### Up to Steamer Pierrepont.

The steamer Pierrepont will be the first boat to break the ice to the island this spring. At the present time the steamer Wolfe Islander is ashore on the island and the veteran Pierrepont will be forced to go over and pull her off. It is understood that the Wolfe Islander will not be damaged.

There Will be no Increase, But it Will Simply Put Doctors on Same Basis—Schedule of Special Committee Adopted.

At a meeting of the Kingston Medical Association, held on Monday night, the medical fees for the doctors in the city were standardized. Reference has been made to the fact that the doctors were about to increase their fees, but there is no increase, the doctors simply making a tariff of fees, on the same basis as some other cities.

Kingston doctors have never had a local tariff, or basis of fees, and it might be stated that for the past fifteen years the fees in Kingston have been lower than neighboring places. An attempt was made, on several occasions, to adopt some basis, at the same time looking after the legal and of the matter, and some months ago a special committee was appointed to draw up such a tariff.

This committee got down to work, with the result that at the meeting on Monday night, a tariff was submitted which met with the approval of every doctor present, and which was adopted with an amendment whatever the details. The meeting was well attended, eighteen doctors being in attendance. Dr. James Third was in the chair.

The schedule of fees, as drawn up, and which was adopted, is on the same basis as Peterboro, Belleville, Ottawa and Niagara Falls districts, so it can be seen that the local doctors are not asking for an increase. Some of the local doctors have been charging these same fees, while others have not, so now all the doctors will be on the same basis.

After the schedule has passed the Ontario Medical Council, it will stand the legal test, and the tariff will be sent on to the council at once, and will then go into effect after the next meeting of the local doctors. Another matter which will be taken up by the association, is that of lodge and contract practice, undertaken by the doctors. The special committee which submitted the tariff of fees will be continued in office, and will be asked to submit a report dealing with these two matters, and the said report will be considered by the association.

The matter was discussed at some length at Monday night's meeting, but it was finally decided to leave the matter with the committee for a report. In some places doctors have contracts with railways and various companies to attend men injured, and some are paid a stated salary, for the year, while others are paid for the service they render in such cases. Lodges have a system by which they set a sum of money for the yearly attendance of sick members.

The matter will be thoroughly investigated by the committee and reported upon.

A special programme is being carried out this Easter week, among the juniors and intermediates of the Y.M.C.A. boys' department. Tuesday the vocal gym class was held at 7:30 p.m. and on Wednesday aquatic games were the special feature. At 4 p.m. Thursday the boys will play games, etc., in the gym, and in the evening at 7:30 o'clock a reception will be given the juniors and intermediates. The presentation of the swimming medals will be made. The Ladies' Auxiliary of the Y.M.C.A. will give refreshments, and some time will be spent in the gym. The boys are craving for "owners," but the ladies will decide what form the "feet" will take.

Friday morning at 10 o'clock the Y.M.C.A. club will start on a "bike" to Fort Henry and surrounding country, which is open to all the boys and adults. The key note is "Bring a lunch." There will certainly be something doing, over hill and vale, and through the bush. The boys will all be there "with their bells on." The big week will close on Saturday with, as well as the usual gym classes, a social at eight o'clock in the evening, for the Sunday morning Bible classes, at which, of course, there is sure to be an encouraging attendance.

## THE DURBAR PICTURES

PRESENTED ON MONDAY EVENING AT THE GRAND.

They Are Simply Magnificent—Everyone in Kingston Should Make it a Point to See Them.

The Durbar pictures were presented at the Grand Opera House yesterday afternoon and evening, large audiences being present on both occasions. It is difficult to find words to describe the wonders of these views of the great Indian pageant in which the king-emperor and queen-empress were the central figures. Word-painters who were present at Delhi last December acknowledge their inability to describe the wonderful scenes they witnessed there. To see the vast plain in the Durbar encampment, where 50,000 troops were gathered to do honor to the ruler of India, teeming millions, Sikhs, Yankhas, Bengalees, Pathans, killed Scots, British foots, and Irish lancers were there, rubbing shoulders with the other in a manner to thrill the imperialist and delight everyone. Haling prizes in their splendour with their towering elephants, laden with their gem-encrusted trappings were everywhere in evidence. Veterans of the Indian mutiny held their old heads proudly as they marched past the royal ensign and saluted the new king-emperor.

Every phase of this event was presented in its wealth of color and gorgeous detail. All the familiar faces thrown on the canvas and all the stirring events received generous applause. The military review before his majesty when 50,000 troops marched past, the royal standard, was also presented; as also was the charges of the English and native cavalry and the manoeuvring of the cannon, corps and artillery.

Among the subjects shown last evening were the "Arrival of the King and Queen at Bombay"; "The Grand Entry into Bombay"; "Preparing for the Coronation Durbar"; "The Royal Arrival at Delhi"; "Rehearsing the Calcutta Pageant"; "The Coronation Durbar Ceremony"; "The Camp of the King at Delhi"; "The State Garden Party"; "The Horse Races," and several other beautiful scenes.

Every night and matinee every afternoon this week will this beautiful work of art be presented.

Is Ready to be Floated From Kingston Drydock.

The steamer Port Colborne, which has been in the dock of the Kingston Shipbuilding company for the past few weeks for repairs, has been finished, and is ready to be floated. It will be remembered that the Port Colborne scraped her bottom in the Lachine canal in the fall, and was brought to Kingston, where her cargo of cement and hardware was unloaded before going into the dock. Thousands of bags of cement were stored in the freight shed on Swift's wharf. The Port Colborne lay at the Great company's wharf until the middle of the winter, when the ice was cut away around her, and, with a good deal of difficulty, she was put in the dock. The keynote, which was in the dock at the time was floated out, but was quickly frozen in the ice just outside the dock.


