THE SPORT REVIEW

PLANS FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL BASEBALL LEAGUE SEASON

To be Discussed at Meeting Next Week—A Extra Diamond is Required for the Junior Baseball Teams.

A meeting of the executive of the Sunday school A.A.A. will likely be called the beginning of next week, for the purpose of winding up the hockey league, and to discuss plans for the starting of the baseball league this summer. There is a slight deficit from the hockey, but it was arranged at a previous meeting that the teams who played in the league "would go down into their own dips" and make this up. It was late in the winter before hockey was launched, and, although the schedule was never finished, it is a good start in this sport among the Sunday schools.

But the game of the hour is baseball, or, at least, it will be in a few weeks, and the S.S.A.A.A. executive will have to get down to business, call for teams and prepare a schedule. Last year the baseball league was very satisfactory, and a great improvement on the previous year. Some very good exhibitions of the game were seen. An amendment to the constitution restricted city league players, with a few exceptions. There is a good deal to be said on both sides, whether this was advisable or no, but one thing must be acknowledged, a goodly number of boys were brought out and given a chance, whose places were filled by more expert players of the senior leagues, during the season of 1910.

One very obvious fact in connection with this league is that it is greatly handicapped on account of not having a good diamond to play on. The games the last two seasons were played on the field between the collegiate institute and Victoria school. At one time last year it was suggested to request the city council to put the other diamond on the cricket field in shape, but it appears nothing was done about it. The parks committee fitted up the diamond for the city league at the other end of the field.

It is said the active vice-president of the S.S.A.A.A., and the secretary and treasurer, will all be compelled to tender their resignations from office, on account of other duties. President J. R. Forster, will, it is hoped, receive the same support that his predecessors have in the past, and the baseball season will be a decided success this summer.

Notes on Sports.

England beat Belgium at soccer football and France at rugby.

Longboat and Quail are under contract to race in Watertown, N.Y., on the 26th inst.

At the semi-annual meeting of the Ontario Curling Association the number of clubs was reported at 102, and the registered membership at 4,838. Secretary MacLennan is retiring after twelve years in office.

Alfred Shrub, the veteran runner, has applied to the Canadian Olympic committee for the position as coach to the Canadian Olympic team.

The south is to be abandoned by the New York Americans as spring training grounds. Next spring the Highlanders will go to Bermuda, where they will train on a field which has been leased by the Jersey City International League Club for five years.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Steamer Cataract Bought by Maple Leaf Milling Company.

The Maple Leaf Milling company, of Montreal and Toronto, recently purchased the steamer Cataract, which was burned near Brockville last spring. The aft portion of the vessel was burned to the water's edge, and down through the engine room. She is being rebuilt at Brockville. The Cataract belonged to Toronto parties. She was formerly the Miles, which, about twenty years ago, ran on the shoal in Kingston harbor, out from the foundry, thereby discovering the familiar Miles shoal. When fitted up she will be used for storage purposes in Montreal harbor. The Maple Leaf Milling company, which conducts a forwarding business, in connection with its milling trade, also recently purchased the steamer Algonquin, and it is understood, is negotiating for another steam barge, the sister ship to the Cataract, well known to local mariners.

About a dozen city ship carpenters, are, at the present time, in Brockville, assisting in the overhauling of the steamer barge Senator, Derbyshire, which is owned by Antoine Wendling, of that town.

The steamer Missisquoi, owned by the Rockport Navigation company, which has been on the ways on the Kingston wharves, this winter, is in the hands of workmen. She navigates on the St. Lawrence passenger and freight route, Hull and general overhauling is under way. Parties are negotiating for the purchase of this boat for the Ontario and Quebec navigation company, of Picton. In the event of the transfer, it is thought the steamer Lomaude will take the Missisquoi's run of the St. Lawrence, with Capt. Carnegie as chief officer.

The steamer Quinte Queen, which, for the past two years has been running on the Bay of Quinte-Kingston route, will go to Ottawa shortly after navigation opens. The Napanee and Adolphustown Navigation, which bought and rebuilt the Queen two years ago, have sold her to the Belle Isle Steamboat company, of Ottawa. The rebuilding two years ago was somewhat extensive, she being lengthened and widened. The Queen is at present lying at Napanee, and will run on an excursion route at the capital, this summer.
