BETTER PRICES PAID

IN UNITED STATES FOR THE HAY GROWN

In Frontenac, Lennox, Hastings and Addington Than for That Grown in Other Ontario Counties.

The hay grown in the counties of Frontenac, Lennox, Hastings and Addington, according to a statement made by F. S. S. Johnson, American consul at this port, realizes better prices in the American markets than that grown elsewhere in Canada. The value of hay exported from Kingston and vicinity for the six months ending March 31st, 1912, amounted to \$137,000.

The exportation of hay from Canada to the United States has increased greatly in the last two or three years, and during the ten months ended January 31st, 1912, amounted to 516,361 tons, valued at \$2,883,155. The provinces furnishing this hay were as follows: Quebec, 365,182 tons; Ontario, 142,819 tons; New Brunswick, 7,054 tons; Prince Edward Island, 1,245 tons; Nova Scotia, 56 tons, and Yukon, 5 tons.

During the same period the United States exported 14,273 tons, valued at \$237,272, to Canada, most of this going to British Columbia and the Yukon territory.

As stated, the better quality of hay is grown in this part of Ontario and sells for \$12 to \$16 a ton on the local market. With the freight, duty and profits of the various dealers, the consumer in the United States must pay \$25 to \$30 a ton.

HAD TEN HUSBANDS.

And Cruel Judge Held She Was More Untruthful Than Looney.

Allentown, Pa., April 10.—Baldly declaring she had never been married to any man, Mrs. Jenny Schwoyer pleaded not guilty when placed on trial for having ten husbands. After the records had been produced to show that she had been married at least three in this city alone, her lawyer changed her plea to non vult. He begged for clemency on the score that when she was a little girl she had been kicked by a horse, and was unbalanced. Judge Treller, after cross-examining her, vented the opinion she was more untruthful than looney, and sent her to jail for a year.

FUTURE OF FUEL OIL.

Sir John C. Nutting Says Coal Strike Has Hastened Change.

San Francisco, April 10.—"Whatever may be the outcome of the British coal strike," Sir John C. Nutting, a prominent Irish capitalist, who is visiting here, said, "it is certain to hasten the introduction of fuel oil for industrial consumption."

"The use of oil as fuel was bound to come sooner or later, but the present strike seems to be bound to open the way."

HOW BURBAR FILMS WERE MADE

King George Aided in Making Them a Success.

Charles Urban, the inventor of kinemacolor, is the man to whom credit is due for the remarkable motion pictures of the Durbar, now being shown at the Grand Opera House. He secured the King's official consent to perpetrating the ceremonies in the film, and personally superintended the making and developing of the negatives.

"King George," says Mr. Urban, "showed the greatest interest in the pictures, and his royal commands left nothing undone that would contribute to their success. On several occasions it was necessary for our sight operators to be placed high above the surrounding crowds on structures that would be absolutely free from vibration. For this purpose the government erected special stands of concrete. Every precaution was taken to guard against a rumored attempt to destroy the films. Armed soldiers guarded the section of the process camp where they were kept.

"Even the water used in developing them was carefully tested to make sure that no harmful acids had been introduced into it. As a final precaution against theft or fire each film was placed in a metal cylinder, and these cylinders were in turn placed in a huge wooden chest, which was buried in the earth until time for shipment to England.

"The light in India proved wonderfully good. It was so favorable that we were able to take the great extra charge in the extra ordinary rate of fifty-five pictures a second.

"In order that the presence of our operators should not mar the superb color scheme of the review I had them dressed in colors which blended with their immediate environment. Those on top of the pavilion were dressed in white and those behind the soldiers in khaki.

"All in all, we made about 61,000 feet of pictures on Indian soil. The part in which I take the most pride is that in which twenty-eight princes of royal blood, including all of India's most famous rulers, were taken in a single group.

CONSERVATIVES HELP LIBERAL

Subscribe Thousand Dollars to Fight Election Protest.

London, Ont., April 10.—In December the conservatives of East Middlesex joined with the liberals in defeating the Whitney candidate, George Neely, ex-M.P.P. Since the election they have given many expressions of their confidence in Robert Sutherland, the present member, but yesterday, a further testimonial was given in the form of a donation of one thousand dollars subscribed by ten of the leading conservatives of Dorchester.

The money was deposited with J. M. McEvoy, of this city, and when they visited the solicitor's office and laid down on his desk a thousand dollars in cash they also handed the following documents, which speak for itself:

"Dorchester, April 9.—We, as Conservatives of North Dorchester, in the east riding of Middlesex, take great pleasure in forwarding the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to Mr. Robert Sutherland, M.P.P., showing him our greatest sympathy towards his unjust treatment on behalf of the protest entered against him by Mr. Neely, ex-M.P.P. (Signed): David Gilmour, Levi Atwell, George Hunt, James Smith, William Wallace, W. Hartle, Morley Lane, Thomas Lane."

TAFT WILL NEVER SUCCEED

In Again Being Elected President of United States.

Rochester, N.Y., April 10.—Balloting has not yet taken place at the republican state convention here, to-day, and it is still in doubt who will carry the day. Elihu Root made an impassioned appeal for President Taft. Senator Pendergast declared Mr. Taft should be defeated, and Col. Roosevelt made the republican candidate, in view of the failure of Taft's reciprocity treaty with Canada. Mr. Taft would never again be elected president of the United States, he said.

LEAPED FROM SKYSCRAPER.

New York Parachute Jumper, Makes 37 Storey Drop.

New York, April 10.—Frank Law, the parachute jumper, who recently made a successful leap from the Statue of Liberty, performed another sensational feat, yesterday, in jumping from the top of the thirty-seven storey Bankers' Trust building, at Wall and Nassau streets. He landed safely on a roof of the sub-treasury building, a two-storey structure adjoining.

Recognized His Picture.

Winnipeg, April 10.—William R. Shaver, president of the Golden Rule Oil company, of Canton, Ohio, charged with forgery, was arraigned yesterday, and remanded until an Ohio officer can arrive. His affinity, Ethel Wynne, the cousin of his wife, who fled with him, is under surveillance. They were living in a fashionable section. He was recognized by his resemblance to a picture in a circular sent out by the Ohio police.

Gave Life to Mission Work.

Brussels, Ont., April 10.—News was received by Mrs. W. H. Ferguson, of Morris township, that her sister, Miss Grace Irwin, who is a missionary at Yau Kuo, China, under the China Inland Mission, is dead.

It is twenty-three years since she went to the field and she has only been home once. Two other sisters are also in the mission field in China.

Joke on Premier Borden.

London, Eng., April 10.—Truth today takes a rise out of the Right Hon. R. L. Borden, the protectionist premier of Canada, for having to pay four hundred dollars duty on his Windsor court uniform, cocked hat and sword, recently purchased in London.

Woman to Walk 1,000 Miles.

New York, April 10.—Mrs. David Beach started this morning on her thousand mile walk to Chicago, in forty days, eating nothing but raw food. She will take two meals a day.
