HAS TOO MUCH MONEY.

Some day—and may it be soon—the dominion railway commission will investigate the freight charges in the west, and give a ruling which will have the desired effect. OIL LOCOMOTIVES EMPLOYED.

C.P.R.'s Action Will Result in Lessening Forest Fires. Ottawa, April 16.—There will be fewer fires in the Rocky Mountain forests in future. The Canadian Pacific has notified R. H. Campbell, head of the forestry branch, that after July 1st, all trains in the Canadian Pacific Field-Kamloops division will be drawn by oil burning locomotives. This division includes the heaviest grades in the line and in the past many of the forest fires have been attributed to sparks and cinders blown out by laboring coal driven engines.
