JUBILEE WAS CELEBRATED

OF Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell, of Montreal.

Montreal Gazette. An active ministry of fifty years in the Presbyterian church received on Thursday night recognition at the hands of the Montreal Presbytery, and also by representative ministers of all denominations of the Protestant church. The recipient of these honors was Rev. Robert Campbell, D.D., former pastor of the congregation, which went to form part of what is now the First Presbyterian church, and it was in this church that last night's gathering was held. It was not, however, parochial ministrations only that won for him many tributes, but the fact that he has held office in many and responsible positions in his church and has also been an active figure in the intellectual and civic life of the community at large. This was set forth in an address which was presented him, and the written tribute was backed up by a more tangible gift of a purse of six hundred and fifty dollars.

Rev. Malcolm Campbell, his successor, in the pastorate, presided, and members of the Presbytery as well as ministers of sister churches.

WILL DRIVE OUT MOSQUITO.

To Discuss Question of Getting Rid of the Pest.

"In addition to an elaborate proposal for the drainage of thousands of acres of swamp and lowlands the National Drainage Congress at its meeting this month will take up the matter of ridding the tracts of mosquitoes," says H. L. Davey, in the Detroit Free Press. "The success of the government in ridding the Panama canal zone of these pests shows what we can do, and eventually the mosquito will have to find another home than the Mississippi valley."

"Drainage is as big an affair as irrigation. As much land will be affected and it means the bringing under cultivation of immense acres of the most fertile soil. From St. Louis south this condition exists in a great area and eventually these lands will be bearing wonderful crops. The reclaimed districts in Louisiana are remarkable and are adding much to the wealth of the state. Other sections have taken it up and in the next five years a great deal of work will be done, canals dug and dikes built, and in time this will be of great benefit to the country at large."

ASK \$5,000 FOR IT.

Poor Parents of Seven Will Sell Baby.

Chicago, April 20.—Anna Sapiha, three months old, is for sale for \$5,000 by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Sapiha, according to an advertisement in a newspaper here. There were six in the family before the arrival of Anna and the father, who earns \$15 a week, says he is unable to care for the baby. The infant is the second Italian child offered for sale here within a few weeks. For the other one \$4,000 was asked.

Opposes Card Playing.

Watertown Standard. The New York Medical Journal doesn't approve the relaxation of the Methodist church in respect to amusements because the church owes to its members upon card playing. The Journal has no objection to dancing but card playing offends it. Concerning the pastebards it says:

"Appealing primarily to the imperfectly balanced mind, they soon reduce that of a better quality to the same level. They are comparable in every way to the habit-forming drugs, and lead surely to the neglect of every sane and healthy amusement, to say nothing of business or professional duties. We hope that any religious body which has the power will continue to enforce a regulation evidently based, years ago, upon observation of the stupefying effects of card playing, the effects which are identical with those of 'playing the races,' a pastime which finally incurred extinction at the hands of some too wise legislators."
