SUSPENDED SENTENCE

GIVEN THOMAS W. SANDS BY JUDGE PRICE.

Daniel Doherty Becke His Word and Goes to Central Prison on a Judgment Hanging Over Him.

Thomas W. Sands, appeared before Judge Price at the court house on Monday morning, charged with buying goods stolen from R. J. Carson's warehouse, to which he pleaded guilty. He was let go on suspended sentence. Part of the goods have recovered, and Sands promised to pay for the rest. Daniel Doherty, who for some time past has been one of the leading figures in the police court, and was out on a suspended sentence, was again let go on Saturday afternoon for being drunk. He appeared before Judge Price on Monday morning and was sentenced to central prison for one year and eleven months. It was only one month ago since he appeared before the judge on the charge of breaking into Thompson's liquor store, and at that time the judge let him go on suspended sentence on condition that he kept sober, but he did not do so.

The judge, in sentencing him, stated that he has been on the bench thirty-four years, and in that time Doherty was the second man who did not keep his promise when he had been let out on suspended sentence.

KINGSTON CLUB WAS FIFTH

In the Earl Grey Dramatic Trophy Competition.

A special from Ottawa to the Whig says:

The Duke of Comaught and others from government house attended the performance at the Russell theatre Saturday night, when Kingstonsians put on "A Message from Mars," in competition for the Earl Grey dramatic trophy. They came fifth out of seven competitors.

Commenting on the work of the Kingstonsians, the Citizen says: "A Message from Mars" was an attempt of a more ambitious nature. No less than fifteen characters took active part while eight songs were also employed. The first two acts were exceedingly snappy and interesting. The last was on a lower level. Captain Priddleaux, "Horace Parker" was splendid. The trophy was won by the Strollers' dramatic club, Winnipeg, with forty-five points.

The Kingston club scored 36.1 points, and defeated two Montreal clubs. London club was second, with 41.3 points.

ALL FIRST YEAR STUDENTS

Must Take Athletic Training at Queen's University.

A meeting of Queen's athletic executive was held on Saturday. The senate committee recommended a number of things with regard to the students' physical training, which were approved by the athletic committee. It will be compulsory for the first year students, both male and female, to take physical training. In order to do this, a medical examiner will be appointed, and his duties will be to examine every student who enters the college and decide what kind of training is the best. This will mean a lot more work for the physical director, and it was decided to appoint him an assistant. The medical examiner will have full charge of the rugby and association football teams, and if he says a man is not in a fit condition to play the game, he will have to stay out of it.

Athens Woman Injured.

Mrs. S. Hollingsworth, Jr., a well-known resident of Athens, was the victim of an unfortunate accident, while engaged in her household duties, on Friday. She was ironing clothes, and in the same room, one of her sons, a boy in his teens was examining a twenty-two-calibre rifle. Suddenly as she was stooping over to pick up an article out of a basket, the rifle accidentally discharged. The bullet entered her neck and lodged in the shoulder. The injury, it is not thought, will prove serious.

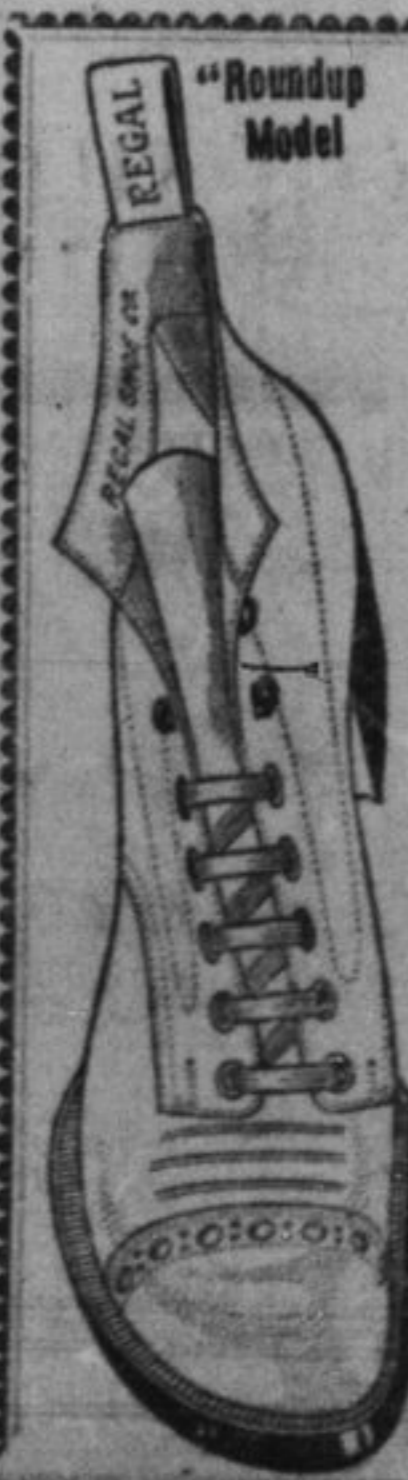

VILLAGES DESTROYED BY TORNADO ON SUNDAY

Illinois and Indiana Were Swept— Whole District Left Bare of Buildings.

Chicago, April 22.—From thirty to forty persons were killed and two hundred injured in a tornado which swept over Illinois and Indiana yesterday, destroying whole villages and causing damage estimated up in the millions. Telegraph and telephone wires were demolished, through out whole counties, and it has been extremely difficult to get information of one kind relative to the disaster. Trains arriving to-day, however, bring the news that whole districts for miles square were left without a single building standing. Nurses and doctors have been despatched with hospital trains. It has been many years since this state has been visited with such devastating tornadoes.
