

GIVES ENDORSEMENT

DOMINION ALLIANCE BACKS UP THE LIBERAL POLICY.

Passes Resolution Favoring the Rowell Platform of "Abolish the Bar"—The Need of Candidates.

Toronto, April 29.—"That we recognize in the policy of abolition of the bar platform announced by N. W. Rowell, the nearest approach proposed in recent years by any responsible party to the often-reiterated ideals of this alliance."

"We believe that the next election in this province will be fought out upon this issue, and whereas the abolition of the retail traffic in intoxicating liquors will secure for the province what legal option by laws have been securing under difficult conditions for individual municipalities."

"Therefore, this executive committee urges upon all friends of our cause the importance of taking action to secure the nomination in every constituency at the earliest possible date of candidates of character and ability whose declared policy will be the farthest advanced in that direction."

These resolutions were passed by the executive committee of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance after three hours' deliberation, with President Gibson in the chair, and members present from all parts of the province.

SPENT FIFTY YEARS.

Dr. Kennedy is an Old Resident of Perth.

Perth Courier. Dr. J. F. Kennedy came to Perth from Kingston fifty years ago (last April 21st, and naturally the event brings up fond memories of his earlier years here and of the associations with the people of the town in that period. Very few of the business men's of Perth in 1862 are continuing to-day, and some of these the doctor could think of are Meighen, Bros., D. Hogg, Robert Thompson, John Hart and Mrs. Laurie. The doctor, in the early days, boarded with Mrs. Miller, in a large rooming house where the Hicks House now stands, there being twenty young men in the house and only three remain now: Peter McAvish, Montreal; William Munro, banker, now in the old country, and the doctor. Perth was a busy place in the old days, and in the doctor's opinion there were more stores than now. Every store at that time handled hardware. The doctor has lived an honest and useful life in the community, and is respected by all. "While I have been here for fifty years," said he, "I don't find it." His seventy years have been healthily on him, for he has lived his life moderately and consistently ever since he left the farm home of his parents, when he started out in the world for himself.

Died in Kingston.

Perth Courier. James Vincent Cavanagh, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Cavanagh, died at the Hotel Dieu in Kingston on Sunday last, from inflammatory rheumatism. Deceased had suffered from this trouble more or less, and acutely at periods, since Christmas of 1908. A year ago he returned home from Chicago, and spent the summer at his home here. This winter his old trouble returned, and a week ago Sunday he was taken to the Kingston hospital for treatment, in the hope he would receive the same benefit as he did two years ago. He pulled up for a few days early in the week, but the strain was too much, and on Sunday he passed away. Jim was a native of Perth, was educated here, and grew up a model young man. He was interested in navigation, studied shipcraft, and was granted his captain's papers, being in charge of the St. Louis. Jim was also a fireman, and a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen. He was well liked by all and his untimely death is lamented by all his friends.

What Thaw Has Cost.

New York World. It is conservatively estimated that it has cost the county of New York, \$150,000 to prosecute Thaw for the killing of Stanford White and to secure his incarceration in Matteawan. How much more is it going to cost to keep him there? How much more taxpayers' money must be spent in opposing the new attempt to have him declared sane with resources of legal and expert medical talent to match those employed in his behalf? The unlimited use of money to keep Thaw out of prison has imposed a grievous burden on the county. It has been obliged to meet a defense unparalleled in a criminal action, and to reinforce the ordinary processes of justice with an outlay to render the prosecution effective which has been wholly extraordinary. And all for what? To secure the rights of the people in the case of a murderer who has received a fair trial and whose possession of money now enables him to oppose further obstacles to restraint imposed on him.

If this worthless human being were to live 150 years he could not reimburse the community in dollars and cents for what he has cost it.

GIVING MONEY HIS HOBBY.

Dr. Pearsons Gave Five Million Dollars to Colleges.

Chicago, April 29.—Dr. Daniel Kimball Pearsons, ninety-two years old, who in recent years gave more than \$5,000,000 to small colleges, chiefly in the middle west, died on Saturday from pneumonia, in a sanitarium at Hinsdale, a suburb, comparatively a poor man.

It was Dr. Pearsons who declared that "giving away money is a greater sport than baseball, and more fun than any other form of entertainment." His death defeated his often expressed expectation that he would live one hundred years.

CHILD SCALDED TO DEATH

In Big Boston Store—Police Denied It.

Boston, Mass., April 29.—Iris Louise Cone, five years old, while seated at the lunch counter in a big department store here, was literally boiled to death when a cauldron of water being filled, spilling its boiling contents over the child. The little girl's body was cooked nearly from the waist up. She died en route to the hospital. The accident occurred last Tuesday. The police denied all knowledge of it until one of the store officials had admitted the accident.

A Lamented Death.

Perth Courier. The home of Mr. and Mrs. R. Sinclair was cast into gloom on the death on Tuesday, of their eldest daughter, Myrtle Agnes, from acute endocarditis. Miss Myrtle returned home some seven weeks ago from Jasper, where she taught school, for a rest, and looked forward to the time when she could return to her duties. For the past six weeks she was confined to her bed, and her passing away on Tuesday was a relief to a wretched illness. The end came peacefully. Miss Myrtle was a bright and accomplished young lady. She was educated at the Perth public school and Collegiate Institute, and Ottawa normal.

NEW MARRIAGE TESTS

Certificates of Health, Wealth and Domestic Training.

Beaton, April 27.—The announcement from Chicago that Bishop Anderson and Dean Sumner have declined to allow marriages to be solemnized at the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul unless couples are provided with certificates of good health and ardent consideration of interest here and in other parts of the union. Rev. Mabel R. Witham, pastor of the Church of Immaculate Conception, announces her cordial support, and as the newspapers here put it, "goes two better than Chicago."

The Rev. Mabel declared that pastors should refuse to marry couples unless they can produce three certificates. The first is to be one from a doctor, stating that they have passed a medical inspection; the second must be from a banker or other responsible person to the effect that the would-be husband has demonstrated his ability to maintain a wife in decent circumstances, and that he should certify that the bride has received a proper training in domestic science and the mysteries of household management.

The advanced pastor declares that she will introduce these rules in her own church, and the announcement has given rise to considerable discussion. She further intimates that she would like a fourth certificate—one certifying that the couple were really in love with one another—but recognizing the impossibility of obtaining an unprejudiced opinion on this subject, she is willing to waive the question.

As the warden was crossing the yard on the way back to work other convicts shouted: "How did you make out?" "We won," responded the strikers, and this was the signal for a similar strike in the shoe shop, where the men, numbering about eighty, dropped their tools and declared that they would do no more work unless the food supply was increased.

Again the warden was notified and ordered that they be taken to their cells.

The third group to strike were the convicts in the knitting shop, numbering about eighty. They had about the same grievance as the others, but after the warden had talked to them, they consented to resume work.

OLD-TIME ACTRESS RETURNS

Ada Ward, Australian Evangelist, Will Go Back to Stage.

Sydney, N.S.W., April 27.—Ada Ward, a prominent actress on the stage for ten years, both in England and the Antipodes, and who left the profession for the cause of religion, about a decade ago, and has since drawn great audiences at evangelistic meetings, announced at a meeting here, yesterday, that she had received a call to return to the stage, and that following much prayer, she had decided to do so.

Speaking with great bitterness she stated that if she lived to be a hundred years old she could never erase from her mind the beggary way in which she had been treated in her Christian profession. She declared that in ten years' work she had made absolutely nothing but her living expenses. For the first time in ten years Miss Ward occupied a box at a theatre last night.

MAD CONVICT KILLS FELLOW.

Man Stabbed With Spoon Sharpened for Purpose.

Warren, Pa., April 29.—In the state hospital for the insane at North Warren, a deadly combat occurred in the ward for insane criminals, when Jacob Cosach, committed from Clearfield county for attempted murder, leaped from his bed to the one occupied by Eugene Hall, committed from Crawford county for murder, and with a spoon he had sharpened to a keen edge on the cement floor, drove it many times into the body of Hall, who died.

The encounter was terrific though of short duration. With the superhuman strength of lunatics they struggled, Cosach laughing with fiendish glee as he sent the spoon into the body while Hall yelled like a demon. Guards pulled the murderer off with difficulty. Cosach labored under the hallucination that Hall was planning to strangle him with electricity.

COMPANY AND ROYALTY.

Makes Demand for Money on 400 Tons Dug Up.

Scranton, Pa., April 29.—Trouble has arisen between Jones and Marwick, contractors on the Tenth district sewer, and the Scranton Coal company, over the ownership of about 400 tons of coal mined by the sewer builders while they were driving a tunnel under a street.

The company has notified the contractors that they will have to pay the latter, return that they are not obliged to, as the coal is under a highway and that the company has only the right to drive gawways through it.
