Several Deaths Reported—Kingston Relatives at Obsequies.

Deseronto, April 26.—A number of men arrived from Lower Canada on Wednesday to work in the big mill, which is to start, Monday. Work has commenced on the canning factory, the place being below the car track, on the Rathburn company garden.

The Deseronto iron works will soon be able to commence work again as it is finished with repairs and has a number of outside men busy.

The steamer Aletha called, this morning, the first steamer for this year. The schooner Keewatin passed down the bay yesterday. The schooner Lazze Metzler is loading lumber for Oswego. A number are going to Rochester to-morrow.

Memorial services were held in the churches on Sunday for the victims of the lost Titanic and requiem high mass was said by Rev. Father Hartigan on Monday morning in St. Vincent de Paul.

Monday last Rev. Father Hartigan united in marriage Miss Beatrice Hunt to Francis Tisdale, T. C. Maloney is in Rockport, taking charge of the customs office until a successor is appointed. Of Alexander Docteur—William Card Made Lighthouse Keeper.

Wolfe Island, April 27.—One of the island's most respected residents died on Thursday morning in the person of Alexander Docteur. Deceased suffered for a short time with a pain in his leg. Later the trouble turned to gangrene. The late Mr. Docteur was seventy years of age and one of the most prominent farmers on the island.
