Former Kingston Bank Man Dies in Saskatchewan. A telegram received in the city, Sunday, conveyed the startling news of the death in Hawley, Sask., Sunday morning, of Norman F. Fraser, son of the late John Fraser, of this city.

The late Mr. Fraser, who was about forty-five years of age, was born and educated in this city, where he remained until about seven years ago.

The late Mr. Fraser was well known and popular in this city, was a member of the Masonic order, a liberal in politics, a Presbyterian in religion, a member of St. Andrew's church. He is survived by his wife (formerly Miss I. Innes, of Kingston), one son, Norman; his mother, who resides on Johnson street; three sisters, Misses Helen, Gladys and Gertrude; and Miss E. at home; Miss K., in Ottawa; four brothers, Rev. Frank, of Ottawa; Gregory, Charles and Oliver Mowat, in the United States. An aunt, Mrs. J. B. Mowat, and three cousins, Lieut.-Col. H. R. Duff, and the Misses Mowat, of this city, also survive.
