The mayor promised to bring the matter before the hospital board of governors, and it was taken up at yesterday afternoon's session.

Ald. Shaw pointed out that nearly all the important hospitals in Canada and the United States have a medical staff, which is considered absolutely cessary. This staff attends the free ontients in the Kingston hospital and also joins with the management in the general working of the institution. Any doctor can treat patients in private rooms, or those in the wards who pay. They can also treat patients, pay or non-pay, in the isolation department. But the free ward patients, it is held, should receive attention from the hospital staff, most of whom' are on the staff of Queen's Medical College. The medical students need help in their work, and the free patients are utilized for clinics. That could not be done if each free patient had his or her own doctor. The gov-ernors, Ald. Shaw said, thought the present rules were in the best inter-

ests of the hospital and the city.
