MAY LIKELY PRACTISE

THOUGH HE HAS BEEN BLIND FROM INFANCY.

Chicago Young Man Says His Fingers are Good Eyes—May Become First Blind Practitioner.

Chicago, May 7.—Surgical operations may be performed by a blind man if Jacob W. Bolotin succeeds in passing the examination for a physician's license which he took today before the State Board of Medical Examiners. He has not every test that has been given him, and examiners believe he will qualify and become the first blind medical practitioner in the state of Illinois.

Bolotin, blind from his infancy, will complete a course in medicine in the Chicago College of Medicine and Surgery this month.

"A blind physician!" exclaimed the young man after he had finished dictating his answer to the final question. "Well, is there anything so remarkable about it? Because a man hasn't eyesight is it any sign that he hasn't any brains?"

"They laughed at me when I asked for a chart and said that I was going in the regular class for dissecting. But there wasn't a nerve, a sinew, a vein, an artery, a tissue that the eye could behold but I could feel with the tips of my fingers. My fingers are good eyes. With them I can detect pulsations, irritations and temperatures—instantly."

"My ears are keen to every little sound within the human body. They tell me unquestionably and promptly when the machinery of the heart or digestive organs is not running smoothly. Or if there is a catch or obstruction in the lungs my ears tell me immediately what is the cause and when I know what to do."

"I am to specialize in heart and lung diseases, and am sure that I shall succeed, for already I have been practising as assistant in the Chicago Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium."

Bolotin was born in Chicago twenty-four years ago. His parents were poor and he was sent to the state school for blind at Jacksonville. He wanted to be a physician, but was
