FIRST CARGO OF GRAIN

EXPECTED AT M.T. COMPANY ELEVATOR TO-NIGHT.

Steamer Turret Court Ashore at Fort William—Fog Heavy Again Last Night—Movements of Vessels.

The first cargo of grain is expected to arrive at the elevator of the Montreal Transportation company to-night from Fort William. The steamer Regina is due to reach the elevator to-night to discharge.

The steamer Windsor loaded coal at Charlotte for Montreal. The steamer Barlett cleared light from Port Dalhousie or Kingston at six o'clock Tuesday night, will return with two light barges for Port Colborne.

The schooner Ford River is at Richardson's wharf, loading to depart for Charlotte. The schooner Julia B. Merrill is at Richardson's wharf and will load feldspar as soon as another consignment is shipped in over the Kingston and Pembroke railway.

The steamer Sallie, owned by Captain Vandresler, Howe Island, was in port on Wednesday.

The steamers Amos and Pellat passed down on Tuesday night. The steamer Sowerds arrived at 1:30 a.m. from Charlotte with coal for the dry dock.

The fog was very heavy again last night on the lake. The S.S. Turret Court is ashore at Fort William. A lighter was raised for the Turret company's steamer Empress of Midland, which is aground at Cabot's Head, near Tambourine, is on a ledge of rock and will be released by jacks. The Playfair equipment from Midland and the Reid Weaving company's outfit from the steamer Turret Cape, are working on the Empress.

The steamer Quinze Queen, which has been sold by the Quebec-Ontario Navigation company, of Picton, to Ottawa parties, is on her way to the capital. She is lying at Swift's wharf Wednesday morning and cleared, going by way of the St. Lawrence and up the Rideau. She will be used on a ferry route.

Swift's wharf, Steamer Belleville down; steamer Dundurn up. Work is being rushed in the yards of the Kingston Shipbuilding company, preparatory to the launching of the government tug Bellechasse, which will be slipped into the dock in a few days. The ways are being constructed and the repair work on the steamer Keywest, which is in the dock, is being pushed rapidly ahead.
