For His Fight With Flynn—The Canadian Baseball League Series Will Open Next Tuesday.

Catcher Lapp, of the Philadelphia Athletics, will get back into the game this week.

Rochester has secured another outfielder in Kauf. He comes to the Hustlers from the New York Americans.

Buffalo have bought Southpaw Ed Killian, the former Toronto pitcher, from Nashville.

Ryan, of Ottawa, is asking the Canadian Canoe Association to lift the ban and allow him to paddle in the championships.

The interest in the Olympic games is waning in the United States, and it has been found necessary to send out urgent requests to athletes to hasten their entries.

At the rate Rube Marquard is going right at the present time the southpaw promises to again enter the bill-board season as the leading twirler of the National Baseball League.

Pitcher Bailey from St. Louis, and reports have it that he will be turned over to Providence. The toughest part of all, he is a southpaw.

World's Champion Arnst, who has arrived in England, for his race with Barry, is twenty-eight years old. He uses a car with a seven-inch blade in a boat 25½ feet long, 12½ inch beam and 28 pounds.

Christy Mathewson says that the thing that breaks a pitcher's heart is the cry from the fans "take him out." But then, the work of some pitchers nearly breaks the heart of even the most hardened fan.

"Billy" Papke, former middleweight champion of the world, will appear in action again at the National Sporting Club, of America, New York, on May 10th, in a ten-round bout with "Bill" Hurley, the middleweight, of Glens Falls, N.Y., who has been boxing in good form for the last several months.

The Canadian Baseball League will open its season next Tuesday, with the following games: Ottawa at St. Thomas, Peterboro at Hamilton, Berlin at Brantford, and Guelph at London. The umpires have been ordered to report on Sunday at Hamilton, and are as follows: Pearson, Toronto; Richer, Bay City; McDonald, Buffalo, and Yerke, New York.

The registration committee of the Ontario Amateur Athletic Union having been asked by a member for a ruling on the participation of amateurs in baseball teams and leagues, which include professionals and disqualified athletes, replies that no exception will be made in future with regard to baseball, and participation in such games involves the loss of amateur standing.

Jack Johnson wired "Tom" Flanagan, the well-known Toronto sporting man and promoter, who handled the champion and his affairs in the memorable fight with Jeffries at Reno, Nev., asking the Canadian to again assume charge of the negro's training camp at Las Vegas, N.M. Johnson will meet Jim Flynn for the world's championship at Las Vegas on July 4th. Flanagan has accepted the offer made him.

Goose an Old Man's Guard.

Bubbling Cup That Can be Lifted.

The one great disadvantage of the ordinary bubbling cup sanitary fountain lies in the fact that the drinkers, whether they be men, women or children, tall, short, fat or thin, must place their lips to the cup instead of placing the cup to the lips.

In an endeavor to remedy this disadvantage, one sanitary drinking fountain manufacturer has designed a bubbler which may be raised to the height of the lips, so that the user may stand in a perfectly easy and natural position while drinking. This is made possible by a hose and cup arrangement, the hose consisting of a double tube. The inner tube is the feed pipe for the bubbler, and the outer tube acts as a waste pipe, carrying away the surplus water while the person is drinking. The flow of water through the inner tube is continuous, no matter what the position of the cup, but when the cup is lowered into its position in the fountain basin, the water flows over it and discharges into the basin, instead of being carried away by the inner tube.
