Bunker's Hill Reports.

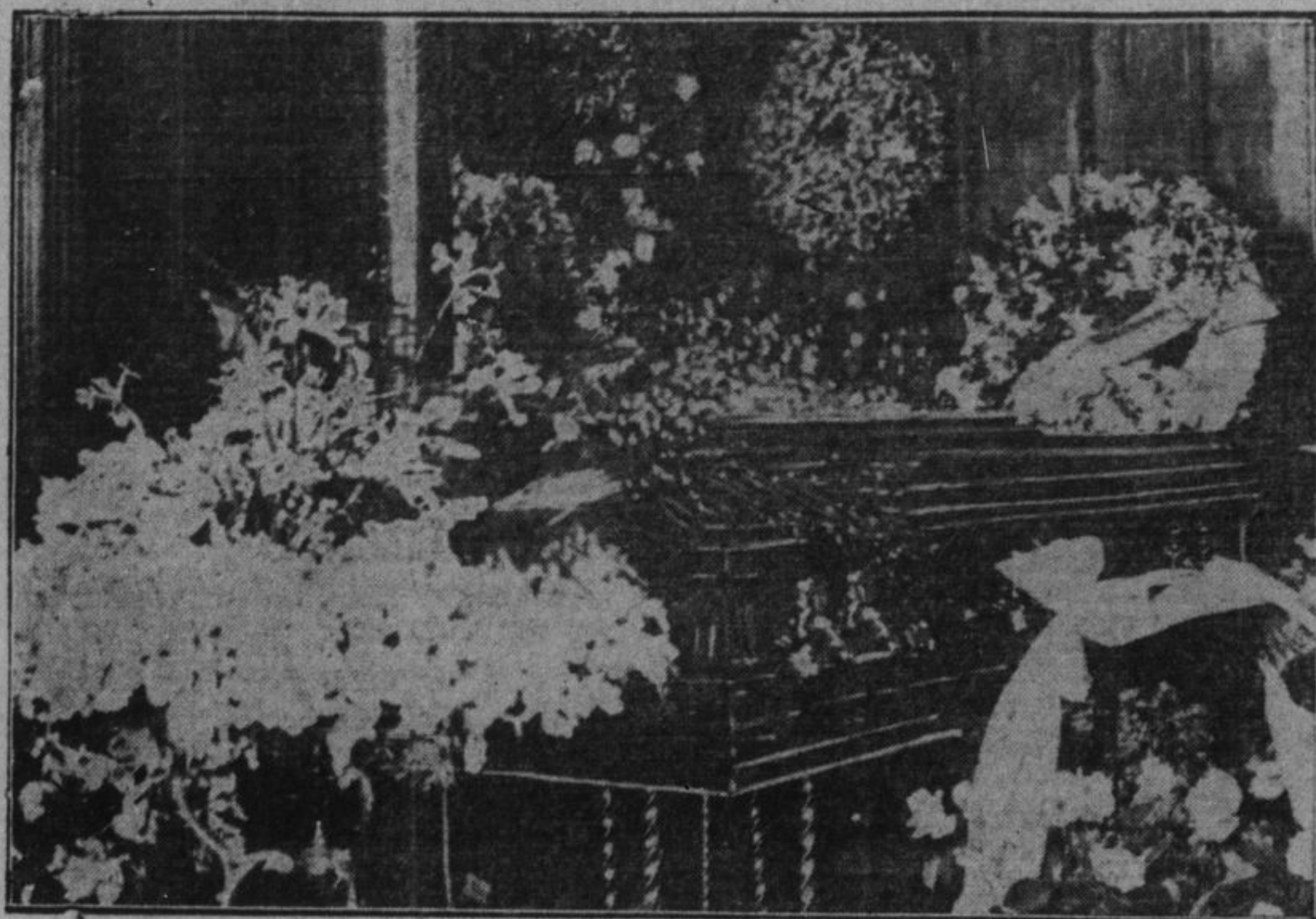
