

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

A LECTURE BY FRANCIS J. FLUÑO, C.S.D.

Member of the Board of Lecturers of the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

A fair-sized audience attended the free lecture, delivered in the city hall, on Friday night, by Francis J. Fluño, M.D., U.S.D., of Oakland, California, on Christian Science. Dr. Fluño is an able speaker and handled his subject in such a manner as to bring forth many words of commendation at the close. Dr. Hadley is a member of the board of lecturership of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston.

Mayor F. J. Hoag was the chairman of the evening and introduced the lecturer in an appropriate address. He said that the lecture which Dr. Fluño was a member was doing a great work, both in Canada and the United States, and it gave him great pleasure to introduce the speaker to a Kingston audience.

Dr. Fluño, before entering into his subject, stated that, some seven or eight years ago he had had the pleasure of visiting Kingston and delivering a lecture, and he was glad of the opportunity of paying a return visit. He had the pleasure of meeting a number of the people he became acquainted with on his former visit.

At the close of the lecture Dr. Fluño was tendered a hearty vote of thanks by Mayor Hoag on behalf of the audience.

Dr. Fluño, said in part: Christian Science is the science of being; it is the law of life, truth, and love understood and demonstrated. Christian Science cannot fail, any more than the science of numbers can fail. The eternal laws of life, truth, and love that are found having their foundation in the one God, can no more fail than their foundation principle, the eternal God, can fail. The science of being is as independent as the science of mathematics. Like the spirit of love, it seeks no reward and fears no punishment. It trends no downfall and asks no assistance. As the eternal fact of being, it can stand alone; being true, and its principle truth, it asks no support from any one or anything. It is the same, whether thousands rally to its standard or seek to trail its banner in the dust. It is a living reality, and its principle everlasting life, and, therefore, cannot die. It will live through all the ages yet to come, as it has lived through all the ages that have already come.

Christian Science is the eternal



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fact of being and does not teach eternal banishment from God, or good, but on the contrary it teaches that all must come to truth at last. God is omnipotent, and being "Yesterday, and to-day, and for ever," the same, His omnipotence forever has been and forever will remain. Hence no other power can be no other power has ever been, no other power can ever be able to stay His mighty hand or thwart Him in His purpose.

Therefore, God and heaven are, and their opposite is not, and divine science is the angel that comes, to-day, to lay hold on that old serpent which is the devil and satan and will chain him and cast him into the bottomless pit (the great nowhere), and all his angels with him.

Christian Scientists being students of this divine science and finding how scientifically true it is, naturally and necessarily, in a measure at least, grow to become one with it, to reflect it, to represent it and express it, in thought, in word, and in deed.

Christian Science Not Mesmerism. Christian Science is not mesmerism; mesmerism is the belief of minds many, that each individual has a mind of his own, and that the stronger mind can influence and take unwill-

ing control of the weaker mind, which, judging from appearances, would be the natural inference, and if the senses could be trusted, and appearances were reliable, this would be the only conclusion that could be arrived at. But we "Thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord" that in the light of Christian Science, the revealer, that mortal sense is found to be a non-reality. That the Bible and science and health, corroborating the scriptures, also the grand and unsurpassed demonstrations of Jesus and the apostles, and the corroborative testimonies of healing through Christian Science, all teach and demonstrate that the one Mind has power over the carnal mind; that the sense testimony is false, and the Christ Mind is true.

Science and health and the Bible, when rightly understood, disclose the fact that God is the only Mind, and the so-called mortal mind is but the carnal mind that must be corrected by the divine Mind. So that Christian Science, so far from being mesmerism, is just the opposite, it really exposes and destroys mesmerism; for instead of teaching minds many, it teaches one Mind, and that the Mind of God, in whom no evil is, no sickness, sin, or death, which Mind must overcome and annihilate the mortal mind or negative mind, as darkness is swallowed up by light.

Christian Scientists, instead of being mesmerists, are finding their way out of mesmerism, out of the belief of minds many, into the one Mind, the Mind that is God, where so-called mortal minds are swallowed up and lost in the one divine Mind, where dwelleth righteousness.

Christian Science is the scientific knowledge of the law of life, reduced to a system and found practical, not only in the physical healing of sickness and sin and all evil, but in the destruction of them off the face of the earth, that His kingdom may come, and His will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. And Christian Scientists are those who to the extent that they understand this great Truth, are practicing it upon themselves and others, who ask of them the same God's blessing. Hundreds are being healed every day, of sickness as well as of sin, and of sin as well as of sickness, and these in their turn are learning the great law of being, and how to apply it in their own case, and upon those who in their turn shall come to them.

No Reality in Sin.

Christian Science teaches there is no reality in sin; that God made all that was made, and all He made was good; that God did not make sin. Is the Bible we read that God is of "purer eyes than to behold evil, and cannot look on iniquity." The Master said "There is none good but one, that is God," and Science and Health in its teachings corroborates these statements, and reveals God as the only good; and that He is only good, that is, He is not good and evil too. He is the one absolute good in whom no evil is. Since no evil is in Him, therefore no evil could emanate from Him; hence, He made no evil, and since He made no evil, and He made all that was made—therefore evil never was made.

Therefore, sin, sickness, pain, and death, do not belong to God nor His creation, and are no more a part of the great fact of being than the errors and misunderstandings of mathematics are a part of the science of numbers; and man and the universe in his true, spiritual sense, is found to be as sinless and perfect now, and as unchangeable in his sinlessness as the everlasting Father—the perfect, sinless, and unchangeable God, Himself.

"Be ye, therefore, perfect, even as your Father which is in heaven is perfect." Christian Science sounds the tocsin "There is no death." St. Paul writes in his first letter to the Corinthians, "The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death," and the revealer saw death and hell cast into the lake of fire. In his most wondrous vision he saw the tabernacle of God among men, and God should wipe away all tears from their eyes, and there should be no more death. Whatever is to be with God, is done. Since, therefore, there is to be a time when death shall not be, in fact, there is no death to-day. What will ever be true, in truth, is a present accomplished fact. What will ever be found to be not true, is not true to-day.

TEXAS BALL PLAYER MAKES UNASSISTED TRIPLE.

Ryan, of Ottawa, still in trouble—Chicago White Sox Player Had Wrist Broken by Pitched Ball.

There are four hundred registered players in the Winnipeg public schools lacrosse league.

Hans Wagner has headed the national league batters eight times in twelve years. Cobb has led the Americans five times.

Hon. Rupert Guinness, a diamond sculls winner, will be stakeholder in the Arnot-Harry race for the championship of the world.

Four teams will compose the new Central International league this year, namely: Winnipeg, Duluth, Superior and Grand Forks, N.D.

A London cable says two American colleges have made offers to Arnot, the sculler, as coach. Arnot will come to Canada and may row Burnan on Toronto Bay.

Tyrus Raymond Cobb didn't lead the American leaguers in driving in runs during the month of April, but he set the pace for the Tigers hammering home eight all on safeties.

Lifty Smith, a Canadian Leaguer last year, continues to make good with Baltimore in the International. He held the Montreal Royals helpless in Tuesday's game at Montreal.

Bombardier Wells, the British heavy-weight boxer, will start for America on May 11th. He will go direct to the coast where he expects to box Al Palmer twenty rounds on July 4th.

In the event of baseball proving a buying proposition in Ottawa this summer the capital will have a brand new athletic field, devoted almost exclusively to the American national game.

One of Walter Johnson's speed balls put Lee Tamehill, utility infielder of the Chicago White Sox, out of the game indefinitely at Washington on Thursday. Tamehill's wrist was broken by a pitched ball.

"Honus" Wagner, although he failed to hit safely in six of fourteen games played this year, including Thursday's, had made seven hits in fifty times at bat, a record of .340. In his last four games he made nine hits in fourteen times at bat.

"Rufus" Ryan of Ottawa will not be allowed to compete in aquatic sports this season with the New Edinburghs. The C. C. L. turned down his application for reinstatement the other day at their annual meeting. "Rufus" now just about holds the record in the line of being in trouble. It has taken him about three years to regain his amateur standing, and still has sections of it lost.

At Houston, Texas Roy Aiken, third baseman of the Washington Senators League, retired the Houston team in the inning of Thursday's game with a triple play, unassisted. With runners on second and third base the Houston batsman hunted for the "squeeze" play. He hunted the ball high. The runner from the third raced toward home and the man at second base came to third. But Aiken caught the ball, tagged the man from second and touched the third base before the man who attempted to steal home could get back.

A Very Successful Student.

Miss Edna C. McGill, recently of Bowmanville, now of Toronto, is receiving hearty congratulations from her many friends on graduating with degree from Queen's university, with spring of B.A. Miss McGill has made a wonderful student record passing all examinations successfully and covering the whole curriculum in two years with a summer session. She took honor mathematics the first year, a course that is seldom taken by females. She is naturally clever but has won her unique distinction by persistent hard work, never having failed in an examination from first to last in her school and college course. Edna was not born in Bowmanville, London, Ont., having that honor. She had passed through the kindergarten and primary grades prior to coming here, where she was enrolled as a third book scholar. After passing through the public and high schools she attended the county model school at Port Hope, and after receiving her certificate taught three and a half years. Although a faithful student, Miss McGill was always a leader in sports and amusements. She has always been very popular with old and young.

A Fine Publication.

May Canada Monthly contains a picturesque account of a wedding among the Morris-Klose half-savages whose treachery has caused many Americans to wish that the government at Washington did not forbid a war for their extinction. The story is entitled, "Marrying Off-Blood Royal," and it is written by Florence Barton Hearst, who went by special invitation to see the strange ceremony, and yet lives to tell the tale.

Matrimony is not generally a matter for scientific comparison and calculation, but a certain young college graduate thought it ought to be, and undertook to keep a basketful score of the innings made by his married friends. Hence Barton tells how the game ended, in the May Canada Monthly, under the title of "Cupid on the Diamond."

Ceased to be Canadian.

Montreal Herald. Donald MacMaster, now a British M.P., expresses the opinion that the British government should have instructed Ambassador Bryce to prevent the adoption of the reciprocity agreement. Mr. MacMaster was at one-time a Canadian, and would then, we believe, have upheld the right of Canada to control its own fiscal policy against any claim that could possibly be set up by anybody. Since he became a unionist member he has evidently ceased to be a Canadian.

Chairman John B. Hanna, of the republican state central committee, who heard the governor make the statement, said he endorsed the governor's views. Mr. Hanna supported President Taft in the primary campaign.

CANADIAN GOLD COINS

Are Now Being Distributed to Chief Cities.

Ottawa, May 11.—The finance department is forwarding to the several offices of the receiver-general at Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto, Montreal, St. John, Charlottetown and Halifax, a supply of the new ten and five dollar Canadian gold coins now being minted at Ottawa.

The ten dollar piece has for the obverse impression his majesty's effigy, consisting of head and bust, wearing the imperial crown and the robe of state, looking to the left, with the inscription "George V. Dei Gratia, Rex Ind. Imp." and for the reverse a shield bearing the arms of the dominion of Canada within a wreath of maple leaves, surmounted by the inscription "Canada" and bearing underneath the words, "Ten Dollars," with date of issue, and with a graining upon the edge.

The five dollar piece has the same obverse impression and inscription as the ten dollar, and for the reverse a shield bearing the arms of the dominion of Canada within a wreath of maple leaves, surmounted by the inscription "Canada" and bearing underneath the words, "Five Dollars," with date of issue, with a graining upon the edge.

The public may obtain these coins upon application and payment thereof at any of the above mentioned offices.

Chinese Views of Millinery.

Speaking to a Chinese gentleman the other day an Englishman asked him if the Chinese ladies will emulate the men and go in for western headgear. In reply he beamed a smile and said: "I am not prepared for something more definite, he remarked: "Did you not know that it is a well-known fact among the Chinese that the reason so many European husbands look harassed and careworn and the further reason why so many of your young ladies refrain from marriage is this very question of millinery? Ladies' hats cost so much that they spoil ruin and so we Chinese have told our women folk that we absolutely forbid them to follow western fashions in this regard, whatever they may do in other directions."—Peking News.

A Titanic Survivor.

The Countess of Rothes, who is saved in the disaster to the Titanic, married into a very old Scottish family that has frequently had, no male head. In a space of little over two centuries the peerage has been held by ladies on five occasions, and the two immediate predecessors of the present countess were countesses in their own right. Lady Rothes, when a lad of sixteen, succeeded his grandmother, who herself had followed her uncle a few years earlier. The present earl's father died, thirty years ago, before his mother's accession. Curiously enough, his grandmother had also held the title as fourteenth countess.
