

A TALK ON IRELAND

BY A YOUNG IRISH METHODIST MINISTER.

Who Says That Many Roman Catholic Priests do Not Want Home Rule, as They Fear It Would be Detrimental to Their Church.

Rev. F. J. McClement, of Gananogue, spoke to the Wesleyan Young Men's Club of Sydenham Street Bible school, Sunday afternoon, very instructively, speaking of his native land, her social and religious condition, the characteristics of her people, and on matters of import politically.

An Irish-Canadian, and not to "show how they do things at home." He said the Methodist church was well founded in Ireland, but church union was away off. Presbyterianism, the religion of the north, really is very bigoted, and has the idea she has all the learning; yet, Mr. McClement said he believed the Methodist standards were just as high. And again, Methodism largely believes she possesses all the religion. Not until these churches got over these extravagant ideas, would union be approached, which was greatly needed, as multiplication of work was a great deal worse than in Canada.

The spirit of Cromwell still exists, Mr. McClement said the Orangemen must live out the principals of Orangeism, which they very frequently disregard, if they are to eventually win out. Mr. McClement congratulated the order in Canada on having a great opportunity and having higher standards and members more constituted than a great many of those in the north of Ireland.

MOTHER'S DAY SUNDAY

SPECIAL SERMONS IN THE CHURCHES.

The Dearest Word is "Mother"—It's the Mother's Early Training of the Child That Makes the Man.

If I were hanged on the highest hill, Mother o' mine, O Mother of mine! I know whose love would follow me still, Mother o' mine, O Mother of mine!

Mother's day, founded five years ago by Miss A. M. Jarvis, of Philadelphia, Pa., was observed in the churches Sunday, when the sermons and music were appropriate and savored of the spirit of the day set apart in honor of "Mother."

Rev. F. J. McClement, of Gananogue, preached at both services in Sydenham street Methodist church. He was very young, minister, green from the Irish soil, as he himself said, supplying in the late Dr. Pitcher's charge in Gananogue; his two sermons marked him as a valuable addition to the Methodist ministry.

In the morning, Mr. McClement, preaching on the mother, the same, and the church as our ideal, based his discourse on Romans XII, 10: "Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honor preferring one another."

In paying a tribute to mothers, he testified personally that it was an answer to a mother's prayers and the influence of a spiritual home that he was in the ministry. He went on to speak of the home as the greatest instrument for good or evil in a society, and the mother as it who chiefly moulds the character of citizens, which eventually compose and control the affairs of the nation.

At First Congregational. Rev. E. LeRoy Rice preached a unique sermon on Sunday in the First Congregational church upon "The Hand that Rocks the Cradle." He drew his lesson from the Gospel of John, where Jesus in the parable on the cross speaks to His mother, who is standing near with her disciple whom Jesus loved and he said to her: "Woman behold thy son; and to the disciple: 'Son behold thy mother.' Even on the cross he did not forget his mother. The greatest word in the world is 'God,' the longest word, 'eternity,' the swiftest word, 'Time,' the neatest word 'Hypocrisy,' the roughest word 'Truth,' the sweetest word 'Home' and the dearest word 'Mother.'

As we grow older we gain a new matter of fact way of viewing and we lose more and more of the sentiment. There is one sentiment, however, if a sentiment it may be called, which instead of fading from our lives deepens in nature. That is the love of offspring to parent. One has said that next to religion, the greatest thing was mother love. Not next to, but a part of religion is mother love. The first divinity we are privileged to see is the loving mother's face. The first lesson about God is learned from mother. The nearest thing to God's love is mother's love. A son may leave his home and set up a new hearth, but mother's love and mother's prayers are still the greatest hold God has on him, and are the ties that help to draw him out of wrong and evil.

The speaker said he was glad a lay had been set apart as "Mother's day." We have all sorts of memorial days now to remind us of great ones who have passed, but we are likely to forget that "The hand that rocks the cradle is the hand that rules the world." An old Jewish saying was, "God could not be everywhere, so he made mothers." It might be better to say that "God makes Himself felt everywhere through mothers."
