MORE HYDRANTS NEEDED FOR FIRE PROTECTION

Chief Armstrong Wants Twenty More Erected.

SOME PARTS OF CITY

HAVE NO FIRE SUPPLY FOR LONG DISTANCES.

Hereafter All Street Excavations Must be Reported to the Fire Department for the Protection of the Brigade.

Chief Armstrong impressed upon the fire committee at its meeting, yesterday afternoon, that twenty or more additional hydrants were required in various sections of the city.

A Serious Deficiency. Another recommendation by Chief Armstrong was that the fire department should be notified at once of all excavations, made in roadways.

It was decided by the committee to recommend to the city council that immediate notice be given the department of every street excavation.

Cannot Loan Hose. Chief Armstrong directed attention to the fact that the department was unable to loan any hose to the board of works for flushing purposes.

The chief was authorized to purchase a cellar nozzle at a cost of \$80. In attendance at the meeting were Ald. Fair (chairman), Hanley, Stroud, Bailey, Turkington and McCarthy.

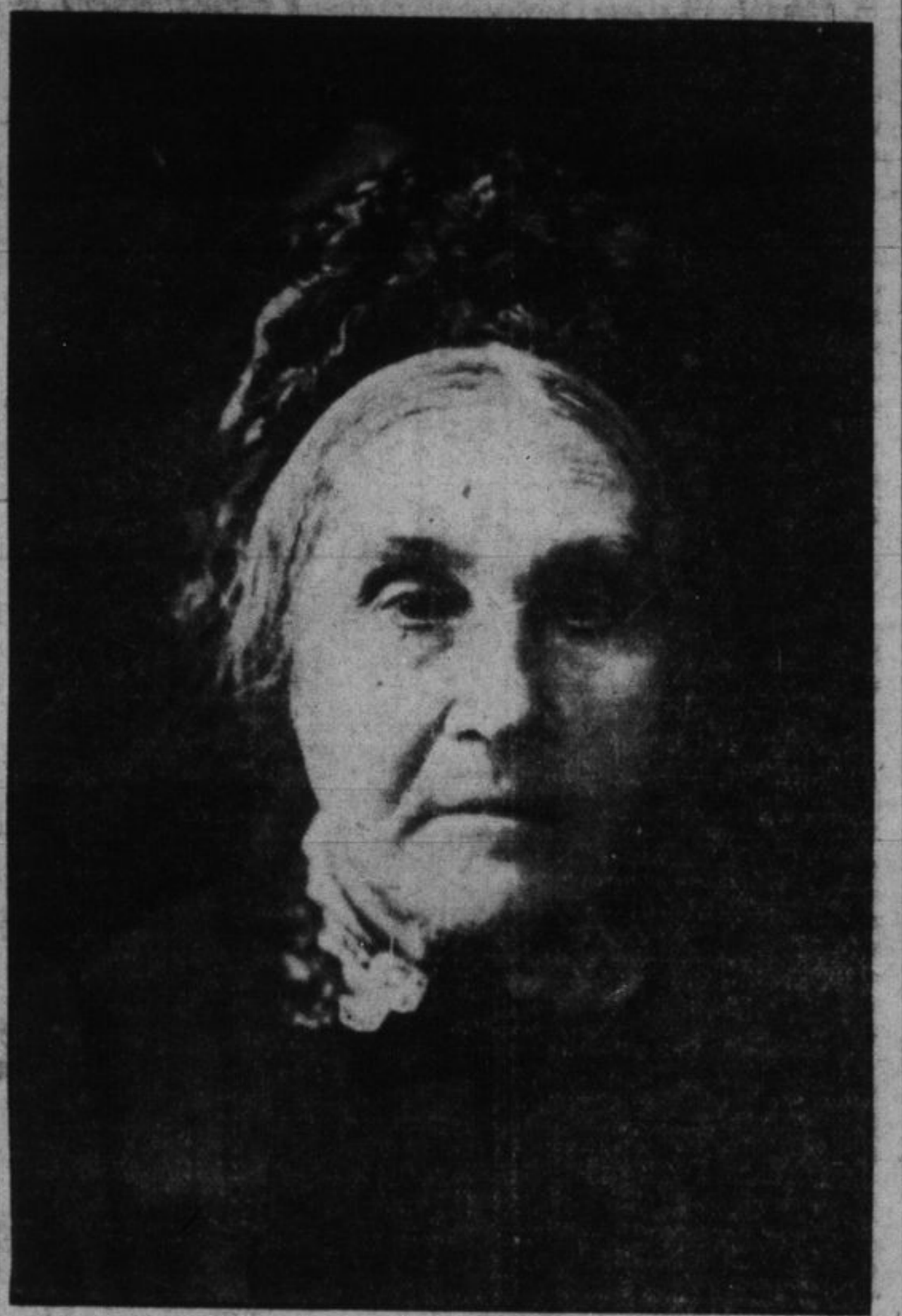
THE ROOSTER IS STILL IN THE LIMELIGHT.

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DEPUTATION WELL PLEASED WITH THE PLANS

Of the Minister of Public Works for Harbor Improvements—Assured Work Will be Undertaken as Soon as Possible—Francis King Outlined Case.

Well pleased, in every respect, with their visit to Ottawa, and their interview with Hon. F. D. Monk, minister of public works, regarding harbor improvements, the civic deputation, composed of Mayor F. J. Hoag and Ald. T. J. Rigney, from the city council, and Dr. E. Ryan, G. Y. Chown and Francis King, of the board of trade, arrived home early Wednesday morning.

The deputation will take over the old Cataract bridge, and that plans and specifications will be secured as soon as possible for harbor improvements, is the assurance that was given the deputation by the minister of public works.

Francis King acted as chief spokesman for the deputation, and as he has the matter at his fingers' ends, he went into it thoroughly. He reviewed the history of the bridge and harbor, also referring to all the schemes set forth for improvement eight or ten years ago.

Mr. King dealt at some length on the necessity of harbor improvement from the standpoint of the Welland canal improvements, and went into details regarding the transfer of grain from Port Colborne, either by way of Buffalo or Montreal, pointing out that Kingston would be the natural shipping point for the grain.

After Mr. King had finished his remarks, the minister asked the deputation if the bridge was now in the hands of the city, and upon being informed that it was, stated that the transfer would be made, and that action would be taken as soon as possible for the new work on the bridge and the harbor improvements.

Mayor Hoag, and the other members of the deputation also spoke, giving the minister some desired information.

The deputation was assured that tenders would be called for all the work, just as soon as matters are properly under way, and that the work will be proceeded with as soon as possible.

It is understood that the work will be undertaken about September 1st. A despatch from Ottawa says: "Kingston looks for a great development in marine matters following the construction of the new Welland canal."
