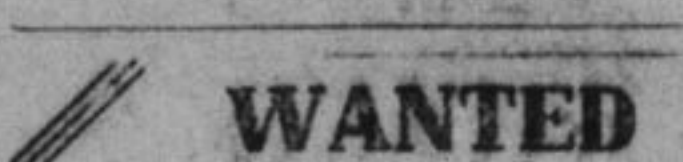

FAMOUS COLORS

How They Were Almost Lost to Winchester Cathedral Not Long Ago.

On the wall of the north side of the nave of Winchester Cathedral hang the old colors of the 1st European Bengal Fusiliers, now the 1st Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers, but few people know that they were almost lost to the cathedral recently. Some twelve months ago application was made to the dean and Chapter by those interested in the regiment today for the colors to be returned to the regiment with the object of laying them up in the India Office, and the application was acceded to. In Winchester and neighboring residence several officers who have served with the Munsters, and who had more than a sentimental interest in the threatening banners. Finding the colors had disappeared they instituted inquiries, but what has been stated above, and immediately an effort was made for their return. After a great many difficulties had been overcome the colors were recently restored to their original place. Beneath the flags is a memorial brass, which reads:

To the perpetual memory of the following officers of the European Bengal Fusiliers, now 1st Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers, who served in action under these colors.

The list of names is then given, and it will be seen that had the colors not been restored the tablet would have been meaningless. Great satisfaction has been expressed in military circles in Winchester and by old officers of the regiment at the success which attended the efforts of Major Munro and others to get the colors reinstated.

It may be wondered why the colors of an Irish or even an Indian regiment repose in Winchester Cathedral. The regiment was originally raised by the East India Company, and fought through the Mutiny as the 1st European Bengal Fusiliers. Major Talbot, whose name is recorded on the tablet, was one of those who bore the colors through the engagements in which the regiments fought. He was shot down, and his blood stained the colors. He recovered and lived to bear them to their last resting place. When the regiment was disbanded, the colors were placed in the cathedral of the diocese in which the regiment was then stationed. They were taken to Winchester with a great deal of pomp, and placed in position over a marble tablet, recording the names of a number of officers who had died in action, near the south transept. Curiously enough some time afterwards it was discovered that not one of the officers whose names were on the tablet ever served under these particular banners, with the result that they were removed to their present position, and the tablet beneath them was accordingly replaced by a number of other names having been added, and it is believed that the only surviving officer who served under the flags is Col. Mowbray Thompson, who had a somewhat remarkable escape from Cawnpore after the massacre.
