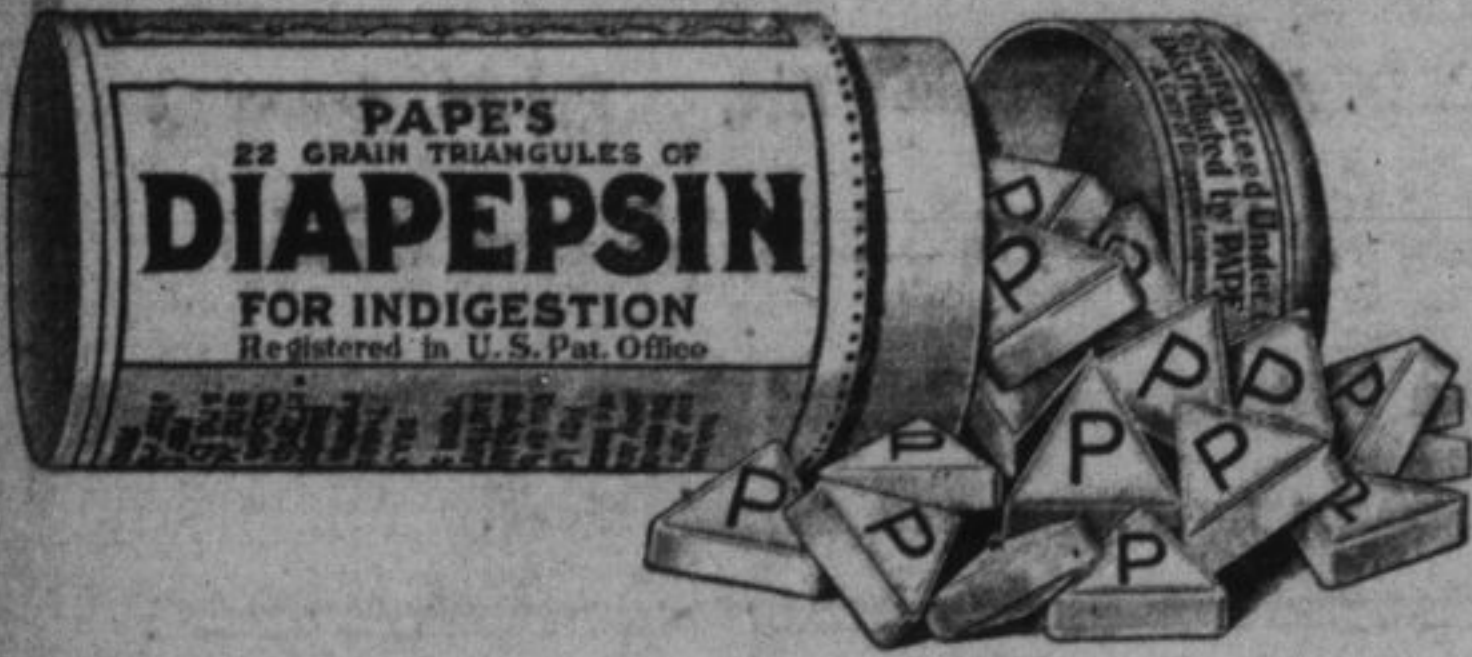

## DISGUISED AS MAN

FOR TWO YEARS PLUCKY WIFE DID HEAVY WORK.

No Suspicion Was Aroused Until She Fainted at Boarding House—Young Matron Passed for Mill-mannered Man.

Erie, Pa., May 16.—A bereaved young matron, vainly seeking her strangely lost husband, Mrs. Alexandra Kozlowski, of this place, only disclosed her sex after various experiences while working in the guise of a man, by fainting at her boarding house.

She was masqueraded as a man for two years, performing arduous tasks in coal mines, machine and boiler shops and paper mills. For six months she has been employed in three Erie manufacturing concerns. She now says she's going to be a maid and has abandoned masculine work.

Alexandra is twenty years old, weighs 135 pounds and is about five feet six inches tall. She has earned from \$2 to \$2.50 a day as a coal miner in the Ohio fields. She has heated rivets for \$1.50 a day in a Philadelphia boiler shop and went out on strike with the union boiler-makers. Mrs. Kozlowski was paid \$1.50 a day for doing a pianist's work in an Erie paper mill, and made as much as \$3.00 a week working overtime at running a drill press in a manufacturing plant here.

She was paid \$1.50 a day for driving mules in a Pennsylvania coal mine, a vocation at which she continued for three months.

After coming to this country with her parents, Alexandra lived at Gary, W. Va., where she met George Zelenski, with whom she fell in love, and the pair were married before the girl was sixteen years old. When their first child died, the husband who was

irreconcilable to the loss of the baby, began to act queerly, and a few weeks afterwards disappeared. The wife believes the baby's death so affected his mind that he wandered away and lost his identity.

To find her husband has been the task to which Alexandra set herself with unprecedented energy and courage. She made every effort to locate him by inquiries addressed to all parts of the United States, but without avail, and her own worry brought her down with a malignant attack of typhoid fever.

Her blonde hair suffered from the ravages of the fever, and it was the fact that her hair was cut short that led her to adopt the guise of a man in her travels to find her husband.

She first tried New York, where she obtained a place in a big restaurant as an elevator boy. Then she went to Philadelphia, later to the anthracite coal regions, and thence to the bituminous fields before coming to Erie.

Mrs. Kozlowski played the part of a man so well that until she fainted no one entertained a suspicion that she was a slim, well-molded girl. She associated with her shopmates as an unobtrusive, mild-mannered fellow.

Although she has quit playing man, Alexandra is still determined to search for her husband until she finds him, inspired by the belief that if he can be found she can readily recall him from his second personality to his real self by his love for her, which she feels has never abated.

## PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Called From All Over the World.

New Brunswick elections will be held about June 13th. E. T. Motz is the new president of Winnipeg board of trade. Contracts have been let for the C.P.R.'s million-dollar irrigation work in Alberta.

Geoph radial railway employees will get one and a half cents an hour increase. J. Preen, a prominent citizen of Lawrence, Mass., was found guilty of planting dynamite during the big textile strike.

The sudden arrival of his wife with a two-year-old child, caused the suicide at Winnipeg of an Austrian, who had deserted her years ago.

Counsel for the United States Steel Corporation have refused to produce certain papers demanded in the government suit to dissolve the trust. At Haileybury, several parties of prospectors have outlived and are headed for Northern Quebec, north of the Transcontinental railway, in search of diamonds.

Sir William Mackenzie has gone to Winnipeg to straighten out the troubles with trainmen over United States crews bringing Great Northern trains to Winnipeg.

The Esoteric Explosives company's cheddite factory, Haileybury, was destroyed by fire, yesterday afternoon, containing a loss of \$10,000. The fire started in one of the crushers.

David Oppenheim, late of Vancouver, was arrested in London, England, on Sunday, on a charge of having embezzled the sum of \$15,000 from Mrs. James Groves, of South Vancouver.

Some poisonous substance dropped into a pitcher of beer by barroom loungers as a joke, is believed to have caused the death at St. Vincent's hospital, New York, of John Emore, a crippled clerk.

Shareholders of the London Electric Light company are being advised to accept an offer of fifty cents on the dollar for their stock. It is not known whether the city or Mackenzie & Man desire to purchase.

## PREACHED TO REBELS.

How Rev. Mark Turnbull, Goderich, Saved His Life.

London, Ont., May 16.—Rev. Mark Turnbull, late rector of St. George's Anglican church, Goderich, has been in Mexico for a couple of years, but finding the climate did not agree with his health, gave up his position and started back to Canada during the recent revolutionary disorders. With him he carried a number of important papers entrusted in his keeping by officials of the United States government, as well as a number of sermons.

Mexican bandits boarded the train before the boundary was reached, and searched all the passengers. Coming to Rev. Mr. Turnbull they found the papers. They promptly removed him to the baggage car and bound him with ropes, firmly convinced that he was a spy. He told them he was a minister of the gospel, formerly of London, Ont., but they did not believe him.

The leader of the bandits ordered the clergyman shot, and the members of the party had their rifles aimed when the intended victim thought of a plan.

"Before you shoot," he said, "I want you to give me a chance," speaking in Spanish, with which language he is well acquainted. "To prove to you that I am not a spy, and that I am what I say I am, pick out any sermon in that bunch, give me the text, and I will preach the sermon to you."

So they brought out his sermons and gave him a text, and he went ahead and preached four or five pages of the sermon to them in Spanish. The leader saw that he was what he represented himself to be, and released him.

When Mr. Turnbull got out of Mexican territory he wrote to Judge H.C.I. for years a warden of St. George's church at Goderich, saying humorously: "The sermons that kept you people from coming to church saved my life."

Mr. Turnbull may be taken back to Mexico by the United States government to assist in certain international proceedings, according to J. East Jordan, of this city, and formerly of Goderich, who tells the story.

Mr. Turnbull's son, Paul Turnbull, who married Miss Beatrice Ernatinger, of St. Thomas, is a resident of Mexico City.

## PRINCE TO LIVE IN WALES.

Penrhyn Castle Likely Home of Heir Apparent.

London, May 16.—There is a likelihood that the Prince of Wales will have a home of his own in his own principality. The recent death of the Dowager Lady Penrhyn makes it possible to put through the scheme, which has been on foot for some time to purchase Penrhyn castle for him. The castle stands on an eminence, two miles from the town of Bangor in North Wales. It is a very imposing affair, with a high Norman tower and turrets. Its interior is notable for its fine old furniture, sculptured chimney pieces, oak carvings, and panelling. There is also a bedstead constructed entirely of alab, which is exquisitely worked and finished. It took fourteen years to build the castle, and it cost \$2,500,000.

## "BUSTED" SIR WILFRID'S BUST.

Art Work of Titanic Survivor Had to be Repaired.

Ottawa, May 16.—When the bust of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was being put in place in the rotunda of the Chateau Laurier, some clumsy workmen let it fall, with the result that the nose was broken off.

Paul Chevre, the sculptor who designed the bust and traveled all the way from Paris to see it put in place, was greatly disturbed on account of the accident, but has managed to repair the damage. The bust was at one time reported to have gone down with the Titanic, on which Chevre sailed. Chevre, however, had shipped his work of art on the Grotagne, and it arrived safely, but only to meet with an accident.
