It has presented the arguments against war in short and tell ing form, and these arguments ough to be equally effective with adults. For instance, the children are tole that for every \$100 paid into the United States in taxes, 873 is used for war purposes, although the United States is the most isolated of cour tries, and cannot be said to have ar enemy in the world. In Europe th percentage of taxes diverted to mili tary purposes is even greater, for the war debt of that continent is estima ted to be \$26,000,000,000, on which the intecest is \$1,000,000,000 everyear. The total direct cost of the arm ies and navies of the worked is \$2,500, 000,000 annually, an amount equal to the value of the total corn and cot ton crop of the United States. The total interest cost per year equals the total value of all the crops in the

United States.

War's Harvest. It is calculated by the national bu of education that in the nine teenth century 14,000,600 able-bodies men were sacrificed in war, and from a physical point of view it is fair to assume that theee millions were the very flower of the nations of the earth. The children are asked to compare the rules of war with the rules of a baseball game. In the game there is an umpire chosen to decide all differences of opinion among the 73 players. Would it be sensible, children are asked, if there were no u pire, and the players were permitted to settle every dispute with fists or revolvers? The causes for war are very often no more important than the causes for quarrelling on the ball


