### The Man On Watch.

Chatham, May 18.—An agreement whereby the American Mausoleum company, of Ohio, will erect a mausoleum at the Chatham cemetery has been signed by Mayor William Anderson and Clerk Merritt for the city, and J. J. Smith for the company. A canvass of citizens for space in the building will be made immediately, and it is hoped to start construction in the course of the next month. The building which it is proposed to erect in Chatham will be one of the finest on the continent. The construction will be entirely of granite, marble and bronze, making it practically indestructible and serviceable for centuries. The plans as prepared provide for 212 crypts, and the building will be so arranged that this total may be increased to 400.
