Joseph Fels, the single taxer, has dropped a quarter of a million dollars in a land deal in England. He was bound to do it. He went into the scheme without due consideration. He knows more about making soap than tilling land, and Henry Georgeism won't make things grow.

Dr. Merchant is mentioned as director of education in Toronto. Something bigger and better and grander than inspector of schools seems to be desired, and Mr. Merchant fills the bill. Well, he is a good one. He has bulked out larger in the public eye since he wrote that very important criticism of the bi-lingual schools.

The Montreal Star will not have Mr. Churchill's plan of developing the navy. It wants Canada to be interested in the navy, and in ships that will be away from Canada, and all the while under British control. Mr. Churchill would have it otherwise, but, of course, the first lord of the admiralty does not know his business.

The government-in-council has announced a decision of the railway commission. It had to do with the Hazelton station, B.C. The railway commission's work has not been arbitrary, and it has not been attacked by the government. This is the first case of the kind—influenced probably as usual by politics—and it ought to be the last.

It is well that the status of the supreme court has been declared, and that the Canadian parliament has the power to refer questions of law to the supreme court and affecting the decision of the provincial courts. There will now be no delay in the argument on the law affecting marriages. It will presently be apparent which is to prevail—the law of the church or the law of the land.

BORDEN GOVERNMENT ON TRIAL.

The federal government may get a lesson in the Quebec election. Its ministers decided that the province should be in accord with the party in provincial as well as federal matters, and the people were told that if they wanted prosperity they should be practical in their politics, and turn out the Gouin government.

will get them without waiting for the federal government, whose premier and minister of commerce turned them down when their deputations pressed for action last winter. Mr. Borden was reminded of his promise, and he shrugged his shoulders and remarked that Saskatchewan had not voted for him.

The word to this effect was not a request but a command. It was accompanied with a threat, that disobedience of orders would be followed by proper punishment. The province would be denied its just share of the good things in the way of public works. The answer has been given. Quebec stands by the Gouin government, and in due time it will take care of the Borden government if its members do not behave themselves.

And yet two of his colleagues, Messrs. Roche and Rogers, of Manitoba, are off to Saskatchewan to direct the attack on the Scott government, which, like the Gouin government, has been a good one and has met every right expectation of the people. They will be invited to un-bosom themselves at a banquet in Regina, and to tell what the Borden government will do if the electors desert the Scott government. One can imagine the effect of their mission, conceived in a spirit of mischief, and carried out by men who have no interest in the province and no plan save to help Mr. Haultain in his distress.

Saskatchewan will probably deal likewise with the attempt that is being made to bulldoze it. The election of September is recalled. The great west desired freer trade with the American people. It wanted access to the larger market, and it was promised this in the reciprocity treaty. Mr. Borden refused to believe that there was any virtue in a change of tariff, but he promised terminal elevators, the Hudson's Bay railway, and any thing else which would help the western provinces. They voted against him and they are against him now.

It will be remembered that Mr. Haultain sold out to the Borden party last September. He was in favour of tariff revision, downward—he voted for reciprocity in the legislature, and he ratted in the election. He cannot get supporters to champion his cause in the local election; indeed some men, who were conservatives in the last appeal and legislation, are running as liberals and supporters of Mr. Scott. Haultain needs some encouragement, but it is more than doubtful if he can get it in any bribe the federal ministers can offer at this particular juncture.

The fact is that in the local election, now pending, the electors are disposed to pronounce upon federal rather than provincial matters. They want better transportation facilities, and they will get what they want from the railway companies, not the government. They want elevators, and
