REMINISCENCE OF 1887 WHEN WILLIAM O'BRIEN WAS ATTACKED BY MOB After He Had Delivered an Address in Kingston—The Night of May 20th Was One Long to Be Remembered. To-day, May 20th, is the twenty-fifth anniversary of the visit to the city of the famous Irish leader, William O'Brien, and the stormy events in connection with his stay in Kingston. The noted Irishman came from Ottawa, and was met at the Kingston and Pembroke railway station on his arrival, at 5.30 p.m. Those composing the reception committee were K. J. Gardner, E. Ryan, J. Walsh, D. D. O'Gorman, P. Devlin, J. Kavanagh, W. Duffy, E. Coyle, N. Marchand and W. P. Killeavan. Mayor John Carson and the chief of police, with ten constables, were on hand, but at this stage of the proceedings their assistance was not required.

The procession moved to the Barrett house, where the Frontenac hotel, with a huge crowd, where O'Brien was welcomed by his friends, and he had dinner. On the outskirts of the crowd was a party who sang "God Save the Queen," and shouted for Lansdowne. Other citizens will remember the scene at the skating rink on Johnson street, where the speeches were delivered, and to which the agitators were driven at eight o'clock. They were received by a large gathering of their friends, but the throng on the streets, almost to a man not in sympathy with O'Brien and his movement, went beyond the control of the police. A riot of this kind was profuse from the throng.

After the speeches were over Mr. O'Brien was escorted to the door of the rink, where a crowd was waiting for him. As soon as the top of his hat was sighted, cries went up. In a minute O'Brien disappeared, no person apparently knew where, and the disappointed crowd rushed on to the Frontenac hotel, to await his coming. A Whig reporter was the first to find O'Brien. He followed the mayor and an alderman to the house of Peter Dowling, on Wellington street, where they discovered the Irish orator. Mr. O'Brien was in a very excited state, and told of his experiences in getting to the house. The crowd was threatening, stones were flying, and a bludgeon was aimed at his head. Had it not been for the prompt action of one of O'Brien's friends in grabbing his silk hat and replacing it with a slough hat on Mr. O'Brien's head, the blow would certainly have hit him. Mayor Carson offered military protection, but late in the evening Mr. O'Brien walked to the hotel. It was the late Canon Donnelly who saved him by taking him into a nearby house.

When the crowd found that the Irishman was not at the hotel, after his disappearance at the rink, it moved off and amused itself by breaking the windows in St. Patrick's hall, and the mob afterwards returned to the market square, where it was addressed by Charles Counter and others, and Mr. O'Brien's enemies gave again renewed vent to their feelings. The noted Irishman's visit to Kingston is fresh in the memories of the older residents.

THE LATE CHARLES SLACK. He Passed Away at Athens on May 12th. The death occurred at his late residence, Wiltshire street, Athens, on Sunday, May 12th, of Charles John Slack, aged fifty-three years, three months and sixteen days. Deceased was ill only a week, being a victim of pleuro-pneumonia. Everything that medical skill and tender nursing was done for him but to no avail, and the end came peacefully, fortified by the sacred rites of the Roman Catholic church of which he was a member, and surrounded by his family and friends. Rev. Father Cullinane was by his bedside in his last moments. He leaves to mourn the loss of a loving husband and kind father, three children, Benjamin and Lindsay at home and Mrs. M. J. Kavanagh of Charleston. In politics he was a staunch liberal.

The late Charles Slack was born near Charleston on the farm now owned by John Foster, and afterwards moved to the place he vacated last June to come to live in Athens. From Charleston he went when a little boy, with his parents, to Long Point, where he lived till in December, 1882, when he married Miss Sarah A. Plunkett, daughter of the late William Plunkett, of Boissevain, Manitoba, formerly of Long Point. Deceased made many warm friends since coming to Athens last June. He had also a host throughout the country, and every place he was known. Being of a jovial disposition and fond of music, many a one can recall pleasant moments spent under his roof, in social intercourse, and music, but a gloom is now cast over that happy household which only time can raise. All day, on Sunday, crowds of people visited the house of mourning and offered sympathy to the bereaved ones. The deepest sympathy goes out to the heart-broken widow and children. May his soul rest in peace.

As a tribute of respect, A. E. Donovan, M.P.P., sent a beautiful cross to be placed on the casket. Deceased was never in favor of flowers at funerals, and consequently the relatives contributed none. The funeral services were conducted at St. Denis' church, Athens, by Rev. Father Cullinane, of Trevelyan. The church could not contain the large number from village and country, who assembled to pay the last tribute of respect to their deceased friend. During his discourse the priest had feeling reference to the worth of deceased. The remains were placed in the vault at Trevelyan until Thursday when they were conveyed to Lansdowne and interred in the family plot there. SUNDAY INSTALLATION IN THE SYDENHAM STREET METHODIST CHURCH. Of Officers and Teachers of the Bible School—A Number of Young People Joined the Church.

An impressive service was that on Sunday morning, in Sydenham Street Methodist church, when the installation of officers and teachers of the Bible school and the reception of a number of junior members into the church was held, the pastor, Rev. T. W. Neal, officiating. During the past year over \$1,250 was raised, over \$600 of that being devoted to home and foreign missions. The school is graded, and has five organized classes, ranging in membership from ten to seventy-five. The membership of the entire school is 634—adult section, 154; intermediate section, 84; junior section, 56; primary and beginners, 112; cradle roll, 14; Chinese section, 14; officers and teachers, 80; home department, 60. The pastor, with the officers and teachers standing, read the installation service.

The other feature was the reception of twenty-five young people into the membership of the church, this, with about ten others, being probably the most fruitful evidence of the success of the school. The hymns sung all savored of the spirit of service. Mr. Neal gave an address on the work of the school as one of the three principle institutions of moral and religious education of the human race, the family, the Bible school and the pulpit. For results these three must merge to a large extent, each having its individual responsibility. The pastor asked for the sympathy and aid of the parents in the work, which played such an important part in the training of the young. When speaking of the parents' example being reflected in the lives of the children, the pastor said he could not but hope that the parents in this city—where children never heard the word of God unless in course of blasphemy—had made a glowing tribute to the work of the superintendent, T. F. Harrison, and his staff.

The improvements being made in connection with the Highland Inn, situated in the Algonquin Park of Ontario, 170 miles west of Ottawa, and 205 miles north of Toronto, on the Grand Trunk railway system, are progressing and the addition of fifty more rooms to this hotel will be completed and ready for the reception of guests about June 1st. The accommodation of this popular inn will, when the annex is finished, be for 200 guests. Situated 1,700 feet above the sea level the air is pure and invigorating and there are few places in Canada which offer such attractions to the summer resorter as those that are found in Algonquin Park.

Strenuous Parson. Fayette, Mo., May 20.—Rev. G. M. Walker, a Christian preacher at several country churches in Howard county, has walked 18,000 miles since he began his quest for converts in the county, sixteen years ago. Mr. Walker's strenuous ideas of living amaze the farmers of the community, one of whom, recently, saw him take off his shoes, roll up his trousers and wade a creek which was full of floating ice. The minister was on a twenty-five-mile trip to fill an engagement where the offering was \$3.66.
