EATING FOUL FOOD

ELEVEN IN JAIL ARRANGE A "SUICIDE PACT."

Disgusted With Conditions They Agreed to Kill Themselves and Turned on Gas Jets.

Omaha, May 20.—Dependent mentally and sick physically from the effects of eating what is alleged to have been foul food, and wishing to end their earthly troubles, eleven prisoners in the county jail "bull pen" this morning entered into a "suicide pact" and attempted to kill themselves by turning on the gas in their rooms. When Jaifer Cahill discovered what had happened, James Higley, who was serving a sixty-day sentence, was nearly dead and George Stevens and Barney Kemmerling were in a critical condition. Higley was rushed to the county hospital, where physicians worked several hours before they were able to say that he would live. Stevens and Kemmerling soon recovered under treatment at the jail. The other eight prisoners suffered greatly from the effects of the gas, but responded promptly to treatment.

When discovered the eleven men were sitting huddled together about the three gas jets, which had been opened by them, and they were all in a semi-conscious condition. ELECTION PLOT WAS FATAL. Man Drugged to Prevent His Voting, Succumbs.

Quebec, May 20.—The strange death reported of a man at Lévis named Bernard, who died on the night of Wednesday last (election day). The deceased, according to reports in circulation, was kept in a committee room with another man named Bisson, and kept under the influence of liquor so as to prevent them going to the polls. The son of Bernard, who was fifty-four years old, finding he had not turned up for supper, started out to look for him and, according to the story, found him in the committee room. As he could not be aroused a physician was summoned, and he was taken to the Hotel Dieu, where he died shortly afterwards. Coroner Colquhoun, has opened a searching investigation into the case, and on Saturday a number of witnesses were heard. An autopsy has been made on the body, and the report of the doctor will be made on Tuesday, when the inquest will be resumed.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels in and Out of Harbor.

The Montreal Transportation company's tug, Nadine, which has been in the dry-dock for repairs, has been finished, and the new government tug Belchess has taken her place in the dock. Swift's wharf: Steamer Dundara, up, on Sunday; steamers Rideau King and Buena Vista cleared for Ottawa and Smith's Falls, Monday morning; Belleville, up, and Aletha, down and up.

The steamer Plumh will undergo repairs at the dry-dock. M. T. Co's elevator: The steamer Windsor arrived, Saturday night, light, from Montreal, cleared for Port Colborne, to load grain, for Montreal; the steamer Spaulding arrived from Duluth, discharged 64,000 bushels of wheat, and will clear for the west; the tug Thomson arrived from Montreal, with three light barges cleared for Montreal with three grain barges; the steamer Fairmount and Stormont passed Port Colborne, on Monday night, on their way to Montreal, to load grain and will afterwards proceed to Sydney to load rails for Fort William.

ALASKA BOUNDARY SURVEY. Only Forty Miles More of Line to be Surveyed. Dawson, Yukon Territory, May 20.—On his way into the interior to complete the last forty miles of survey between Alaska and Yukon Territory, Thomas Riggs, chief engineer of the Alaska boundary survey, is here. Mr. Riggs, accompanied by six engineers, eighteen assistants and twenty-five head of horses, which will be used in the final work this year. Mr. Riggs and his party expect to immediately go from Dawson to Rampart, Honnau, which is sixty-five miles north of the Arctic circle, to join W. B. Roaburn, who was left at that station last year with six men. Mr. Riggs expects to arrive in Rampart about the middle of June and to finish the last of the survey about the middle of August. The survey which was ordered by the American Government in 1903, to decide boundary disputes which had arisen between the American and Canadian governments, after the gold rush, was completed in recent time by Mr. Riggs and his party. The boundary line is made by observations computed from surveys under direction of Mr. Riggs, and by a crew of Canadian surveyors under direction of J. D. Craig, the Canadian chief engineer, until the results reached by the two parties tally.
