Boston, Mass., May 21.-Clarence V. T. Richeson, the former Baptist clergyman, and the confessed murderer of his sweetheart, Miss Avis Linnell, paid the death penalty in prison here at 12.10 o'clock this morning. Richeson was eager to die, and calmly awaited the hour of midnight when he was led from the death cell to the electric chair, accompanied by his spiritual adviser. The strapping of the con-demned man in the chair was quickly done, and while the Lord's prayer was being recited, the volts of death were kindly words and assurances. turned on, and Richeson was dead in a second.


