



The problem of the proper disposal of sewage is a world-wide one, and apparently as difficult of solution in some of the older countries as it is in a new land like Canada. Many propositions have been made for the treatment of sewage, but it has remained for the city of Brantford, one of the largest manufacturing centres of Yorkshire, with a population of some 300,000, to turn its sewage into money. Last year the corporation made a profit of \$150,000 from grease recovered from its sewage; and has gone to the expense of a sum equivalent to \$300,000 for new machinery for the purpose. A Costly Policy.

Ottawa Free Press. The commonwealth of Australia is discovering that it is easier to launch on a new policy than to forecast its cost. Official figures show that the cost of administrating the old age last year was nearly £2,200,000, a very heavy undertaking for a population of some 6,000,000 people. Out of every 10,000 of the population 171 persons are in receipt of old age pensions and 17 of invalid pensions, with the total increasing by an average of

These figures will give surprise to some of the advocates of establishing old age pensions in Canada, and while they indicate a serious financial burden they also indicate a lack of peronal thrift and foresight which, we ope, is not prevalent in Canada. On the other hand, it may be said that it is the duty of the state to provide for the old age of its people.
