

LECTURE ON IRELAND SPORTS FOR JUNE 3RD

BY REV. S. J. M. COMPTON IN ST. ANDREW'S HALL.

The Irish Minister of the Kirk gave an interesting talk to a large audience on Tuesday evening.

Rev. S. J. M. Compton, minister of St. Andrew's church, proved another of his accomplishments and displayed decided ability as a lecturer.

The lecture was interesting, instructive, and at periods, humorous, in the extreme.

Mr. Compton, in the beginning, explained the question: "Who are the Irish?" and pointed out the foundation for the fact that Ireland was the first Scotland.

Among many of these Irish minister showed an explained views of Dublin, its magnificent city hall, Trinity College, Bank of Ireland, the old parliament building, and of Queen's University, Belfast.

Mr. Compton touched on many of the outstanding traits in the character of the Irishman, his certain sadness at times, yet of a remarkable sunny nature.

Goldsmith and Moore were among the most worthy writers of days gone by, and Lady Dufferin's "Lament of an Irish Exile," is one of the standards.

The lecturer also dealt with the religion of the Irish, showing symbols of Druid worship, and speaking of the place the Irish Presbyterian church holds in religious thought in the north.

W. G. Craig capably acted in the capacity of chairman. Exceptionally pleasing vocal and instrumental numbers, interspersed the Irish programme.

On motion of John McIntyre, K. C., and F. J. Lockett, a vote of thanks was extended to the lecturer.
