## SURGEON SAVED LIFE

OF A YOUNG WOMAN OF SCHEENECTADY, N.Y.

After Her Heart Had Stopped Beating and Respiration Ceased, Following an Operation for Gallstones.

Schenectady, N.Y., May 22.—After her heart had stopped beating and respiration had ceased, following an operation for the removal of gall stones, Miss Anna Loebenstain, a well-known young woman of this city, is alive and practically out of danger. Miss Loebenstain owes her life to the quick thought and action of the operating surgeon, Dr. Charles G. McMullen.

Dr. McMullen had successfully performed the operation at a local hospital and had just finished suturing the incision in the abdomen when attending nurses told him that the patient was pulseless. Hurriedly he removed the stitches he had just taken and inserting his hand, reached to the still dead heart. He gently grasped the human life pump, his hand closing and opening gently. The auricle and ventricle under the pressure began forcing the life fluid into the arteries to have it returned an instant later.

The physician continued the manipulation with nurses and internes bending over the patient. For more than two minutes this was kept up when suddenly fainting was noticed in the patient's face. The doctor continued the manipulation for perhaps another minute and then withdrew his hand. The heart of its own accord took up its work of pumping and in less than five minutes the patient was breathing properly. She was placed in bed and in an hour or two was pronounced out of danger.

The shock of the operation together with unconscious physical antipathy to anaesthetics is believed to have caused the heart to stop. Instead of plain ether or chloroform, the doctors administered to Miss Loebenstain, before the operation, a combination of nitro-oxygen, oxygen and ether, as they feared the effects of the nausea were either given alone.

Dillon, who brutally murdered at Los Angeles, the woman who named his wife, the mangled remains of a man who threw himself in front of a moving train near Wilmette, have been identified in Chicago as the fleeing murderer.

### BIG BUILDINGS ON QUICKSANDS

Under Certain Conditions Foundation Perfectly Secure.

Strand Magazine. Quicksand, in the popular mind a lurking monster, the swallower up the unwary, while often treacherous, has been safely built upon, and several of the second-class—outdone—skyscrapers in New York rest directly upon it.

It is necessary at the outset to correct the popular notion about quicksand. The engineer's definition of quicksand is any loose friable material saturated with water. There are different kinds of quicksand just as there are different kinds of wood, varying from nearly an inch to several feet in diameter.

The ground in the lower end of Manhattan Island is a quicksand extending from the surface to a maximum depth of eighty feet below Broadway. It will bear three tons per square foot, and the foundations of many tall buildings rest upon it.

Filled-in ground is one of the poorest materials on which to build, as for years after it has been deposited it will continue to settle, and obviously any structure it carries must settle with it.

Ordinary ground will bear safely from two to four tons per square foot, dry clay from four to six tons per square foot, good gravel from six to ten tons, and bedrock from 50 to 200 tons per square foot.

Said, it continued, will stand very large pressure, and similarly water, the most unsuitable of all, if it could be restrained, would be capable of resisting an enormous pressure. Certainly, no force man has produced is sufficient to injure its structure.
