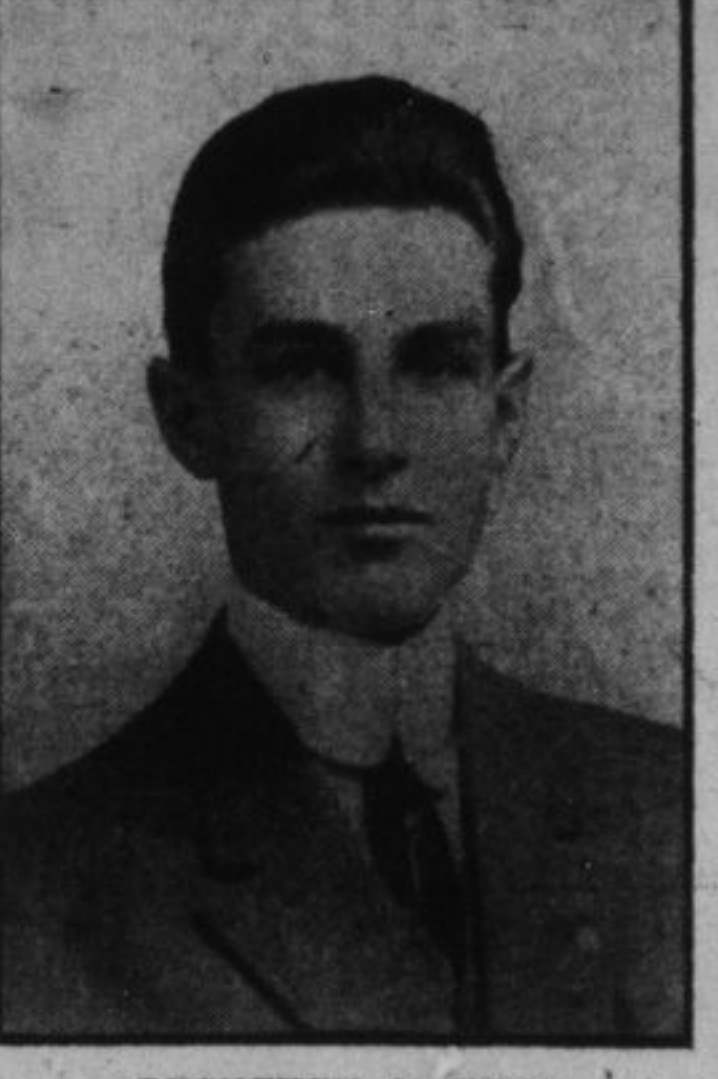
THE PANAMA CANAL

Thinks it Will be of Very Great Benefit.

Capt. A. Thompson, the commercial agent of the Furness Railway and Dock company, of England, is in the city, to-day, en route to Europe, after a business trip extending through Canada to the Pacific coast. To a reporter of the Whig he said the motive of his trip to America, this year was to promote business between both the east and west coasts of the dominion that would be created when the new Isthmian canal was completed. Speaking of the canal so far as the dominion was concerned, he said that the effect would be tremendous, for it would stimulate business from one end of the country to the other, and would foster many industries that under present conditions cannot successfully compete with manufacturers of Europe. There are untold millions of tons of raw material from the Rocky mountains, westward, that when the canal is opened can be worked up and shipped, not only to Europe, China, Japan, etc., but to the eastern section of this country, and that, too, at a profit, for the canal will shorten the route as at present existing, some 7,000 miles and not only shorten it, but cut out the roughest and most dangerous parts of the voyage via Cape Horn.

BECKWITH HAVENS,

The Curtiss Aviator, Who Flies Here on June 3rd.

Above is a very good picture of the first man who will attempt to fly in Kingston or Eastern Ontario. He is Beckwith Havens, one of the Curtiss people's most gifted flyers. He learned at the Curtiss training ground at Hammondsport, and shortly became so proficient that he was in demand everywhere. Reports of his flights at Rockford, Ill., on Aug. 23d, and Boone, Iowa, on Aug. 10th, evoked thrills of pride. Still more recently he made spectacular flights at Middletown, N.Y., on Sept. 1st, and at Lewiston, Me., on Sept. 4th, 5th, and 6th.

On Sept. 11th last, as a tribute of his ability as an aviator, Gleon H. Curkies chose him to demonstrate his new military aeroplane, built for the United States army signal corps. After three successful and brilliant trial flights the machine was purchased by the war department.

On Sunday, Aug. 13th, the aviator was unfortunately badly injured in a railway wreck near Fort Wayne, Ind. Since then he has repeatedly declared that aeroplane travel is far safer than railway transportation.

THE BOARD OF TRADE

SECURED BETTER FREIGHT SERVICE ON K. AND P. RAILWAY

The Company Has Decided to Give Daily Service Between Kingston and Renfrew, Commencing on June 3rd Next.

As a result of the matter being taken up by the members of the Kingston board of trade, the Kingston & Pembroke railway has decided to put on a daily freight service between Kingston and Renfrew, commencing June 3rd, next. This is good news to the wholesale merchants in the city, and they are pleased at the action of the company. The matter, it will be remembered, was taken up at a meeting of the board of trade, held on March 12th. The wholesale section of the board, through R. J. Carson, presented a report, submitting the complaints of merchants against the Kingston & Pembroke railway, owing to the fact that the company did not carry freight every day, to stations on the other side of Sharbot Lake. The wholesale section reported as follows:

The wholesale section of the Board of Trade met to consider the complaints made by merchants against the K. & P. railway, for not taking freight every day, to stations on the other side of Sharbot Lake. The committee consider that they were not treated right, as the road was bonused very largely by Kingston, for daily service to Pembroke. The merchants of Toronto and Montreal are able to ship to customers every day in the week and your committee ask that the matter be placed before the proper authorities so that they may receive fair treatment.

This report was approved of by the council of the board of trade, and by its direction was sent, accompanied by letters of support, from the following wholesale firms: Messrs. R. J. Carson, A. Chown & Co., W. B. Dalton & Sons, Macneil & Minnes, and George Robertson & Son, to Mr. W. R. Baker, vice-president and general manager of the Kingston & Pembroke Railway through F. Conway, acting superintendent of the railway. The matter has received the consideration of Mr. Baker, and he has decided to put on a daily freight service between Kingston & Renfrew, commencing on June 3rd next. The wholesale merchants in the city will be greatly pleased by the railway company's prompt acquiescence to their request.
