TERROR TO WOMEN IN A STATE OF SIEGE

FAMILIES OF AMERICANS TAKE REFUGE IN THE CITY. BUDAPEST CITIZENS ARE KEPT IN THEIR HOUSES

Situation Now Alarming—In One Province in Cuba More Than 5,000 Colored Men Have Joined the Rebels—United States Watches Island.

Santiago, Cuba, May 23.—The situation in Cuba is rapidly growing more serious. It is now estimated that over 5,000 negroes have taken up arms in the province of Oriente alone. Two American citizens, Floyd Schick and Joseph Bryan, have complained to Ross E. Holaday, United States consul at Santiago, of being assaulted and robbed while they were on their way to Siboney by a band of armed negroes.

The rural garrison of Holguin, a town situated sixty-three miles to the north-west of this city, clashed with a strong party of negroes at Sabana de los Puercos. Two of the rebel leaders were killed and the remainder of the insurgent force dispersed. The San Carlos Club and the Chamber of Commerce, have offered to form volunteer corps for the protection of Santiago. Many women and children in the outlying districts, including families of Americans employed in the Juraguá iron mines are taking refuge in this city.

PLACED UNDER ARREST

Charged With Publishing Immoral Literature.

Toronto, May 23.—Just twenty-four hours after he was before the board of police commissioners urging the regulation of theaters at burlesque houses, R. B. St. Clair, secretary of the Toronto Vigilance association, was arrested yesterday on the charge of publishing immoral literature. The Toronto Vigilance association was formed with the object of fighting the white slave traffic and the social evil, and in connection with the campaign a number of circulars were issued to the public. One pamphlet issued May 1st, entitled, "A Special Bulletin," and marked "confidential," is alleged to have contained a number of objectionable phrases. Two of these circulars handed to the board of police commissioners at Tuesday's meeting are made the basis of the prosecution launched by the morality department. Mr. St. Clair is out on \$2,000 bail.

Fenian Raid Bounty Act.

It is notified for general information that, according to reports received at the militia department, some claimants for grants under this act have endeavored to induce persons to make false declarations as to the services of such claimants. Also it has been intimated that there have been attempts at personation of deceased veterans. It is scarcely necessary to point out that such acts are a violation of the Canadian Criminal Code and that they are subject to be punished with long terms of imprisonment. The militia department wishes it to be understood that persons committing such acts will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

Baseball Notes.

Efforts are being made to arrange a practice game between the C.L.C. and Athletics on the cricket field Friday afternoon, preparatory to the opening of the league on Saturday. The C.L.C.'s new sweater coats are expected to arrive and the team will don them on Saturday. They will be the old colors of the club, maroon, with grey trimmings. The Vics. will stick to the old colors that have been worn by several Kingston championship clubs in all lines of sport, blue and white.

The Overseas Club.

The Overseas Club, organized in this city, a short time ago, has now a membership of 197, and is meeting with great success. Tonight, the members are holding a "smoker," and a fine time is being looked forward to. To-morrow, the society will send a cablegram to his majesty the king, extending the greetings of the local club.

Cannot Secure Work.

Three English immigrants who arrived in the city on Wednesday are having difficulty in obtaining employment. They were penniless on Thursday afternoon and had not had a bite to eat since morning. It was about three o'clock when agent G. H. Hunter found them and started to hunt up jobs for the hungry men.

While the Trouble Continues—The Parliament in Session Refuses to Legislate in Favor of the Strikers.

Budapest, Hungary, May 24.—This city is in a state of siege to-night, following strike riots. Troops hold every corner and civilians are not permitted to come out of their houses. The government has undertaken the provisioning of the siege district while the trouble continues. Four were killed and 150 wounded to-day. Crowds marched on the parliament house three times to-day to close up the sessions because that body refused to legislate in favor of the strikers. The soldiers charged each time and drove the mob back with heavy loss. Reinforcements are being sent in from other cities.

GORDON HODGINS SUICIDED.

Body of Would-be Murderer Taken From River.

Portage du Fort, Que., May 24.—The body of Gordon Hodgins, the young bank clerk who shot Teresa Dolan here, last Friday, was taken from the river, last night. It was close to the wharf, where bloodstains were left the night of the tragedy. A bullet wound was in the lad's temple. At the Ottawa General Hospital, Miss Dolan, the victim of the shooting, is reported as progressing favorably. She will return to her home on Friday or Saturday.

FIVE CAPITAL CASES.

Largest Number in Any Month for Some Years.

Ottawa, May 23.—Five capital cases are under consideration at present by the minister of justice, which is the largest number of any month of the past two years. The executions are scheduled to take place between June 1st and June 27th. All the cases are in the west. One execution is to take place on June 1st has been postponed pending the consideration of Hon. C. J. Doherty, who has not had time to weigh the facts.

TITANIC WAS WARNED.

British Investigators Believe Vessel Hit Identical Berg.
London, May 23.—That the iceberg which the Titanic collided with was one of those of which she had warning from other ships is the conclusion reached by the board of trade court of enquiry, after a careful examination of the wireless telegrams passed to and from the steamer on the day of the disaster.
