

IS ALL DIVINE REVELATIONS CONTAINED IN THE BIBLE?

Rev. Dr. Charles Brown, President of National Free Church Council of England, Says Things Are Being Written and Said To-day Worthy of a Place in New Testament.

"Yet many things."—John XVI, 12. I ask you to regard our Lord in the light of those words as the great Divine Teacher of humanity who has come into the world to disclose to men the truth about God and themselves, the seen and the unseen. He has been going about teaching for three years. Every variety of questions he has answered. Every variety of message he has delivered. And now the end has come. The cross that has loomed up through the mists is now a reality. He has gathered His own people about Him. They are ready to be baptized. He has borrowed a room where they can be alone, where, unintercepted, He can communicate His last thoughts to them, and unburden His mind. He says many things to them, many and deep things; about His going to the Father, about the Father's House, the vine and the branches, the coming and mission of the Comforter, His saviour. It may be they are showing signs of weariness, they certainly begin to show signs of being puzzled and bewildered, and He says: "I have yet many things to say unto you; but ye cannot hear them now." And He went away with the words unspoken, to our disappointment and loss. He was always conscious of the condition of His hearers, gauging their capacity, speaking the word as they were able to bear it. It is the only faithful method. All teaching that goes beyond the capacity of the pupil is labor in vain. It may be worse than that. It may be positively mischievous. The truth misunderstood, distorted in the mind, may be perverted to harm in the life. Do you not think that you get the principle of revelation enshrined in our text? That as men were able to bear it, the truth came concerning God and sin and redemption. I take another view of these words when I ask you to conclude from them that all our Lord meant to say to men is not in the Gospels. Only have outlined what He did say is recorded there. And there are many things He could not say. But I beg you to note that He leaves the door of communication open. He declares that the Spirit will come to be men's Teacher, and we know that He came and we believe that He has been in the world ever since, illuminating and instructing men. It is therefore, by no means surprising to find Paul saying some things which the other Apostles do not say, some things about the death of Christ, which the Lord Himself does not say. I hold myself free to believe and to teach that the Spirit said to Paul what our Lord could never say to the other Apostles. That he was a man of larger mould, of broader mind, and more generous spirit; that God found in him an apter pupil than in any of the rest. And I find no difficulty in believing that even Paul could not receive all the truth

IT MAY BE NECESSARY TO 'HERD ALL KAFFIRS' IN 'LOCATIONS.'

The "Black Peril" in South Africa—Outrages on White Women are Becoming Alarmingly Frequent. London, Eng., May 28.—Public attention is focussed once again on the "Black Peril" in South Africa, especially on the Rand and in Natal. At a recent public meeting of men in Pietermaritzburg, addresses were delivered by prominent residents, who made use of strong expressions regarding the question; while a recent meeting on the Rand ended with a stampede and a revolver hunt for natives following on the announcement that an outrage had just been committed, a number of natives being roughly handled. The matter has also been taken up by the Johannesburg Town Council, who have passed a resolution in favor of an increase of the police force, which the press is likewise agitating. It is now announced that the victim of a recent outrage at Tourfontein, on the Rand, has died of shock. The funeral was held yesterday, and was made the occasion for a remarkable demonstration of sympathy. Several thousand people, including the mayor and councillors of the town were present. Two further outrages are now reported, one from Frankfort and the other from Kimberley. An announcement is also made that a native has been sentenced to death for rape at Middleburg, in the Transvaal. In the senate, recently Mr. Munro (Transvaal) moved that a minute penalty of hanging to be enacted for rape or attempted rape. He declared that to talk of increasing the police was to beg the question—more drastic punishment was needed. Colonel Standford, one of the nominated senators, advocated settling the families of Kaffirs in locations and the establishment of a native police force. General Heitzo, minister of justice, said that the whites were responsible for the situation created in South Africa. He deprecated giving way to sensationalism and excitement, and expressed the belief that the most effective way of stamping out the peril was the establishment of locations. WRITING OF "UNCLE TOM."
