"It is Time We Woke up and Re medied Conditions," Declared the Kingston Layman-Ten Young Men Received Into the Ministry.

The low salaries which most of the ministers of the Methodist church receive, was the matter that took the nent place at the laymen's meeting of the Montreal Methodist conference, Friday afternoon. Elmer Davis, of this city, vigorously censured the laymen for allowing a condition that existed in the church, and he stated that the statistical statement contained \$1,298 unpaid salaries in the conference during the year past on the circuits. At the ministerial session on Thursday, one minister, realizing the straits that some of his brethren were in, financially, for this reason, proposed that a tax of one per cent. of their salaries be levied, to bring the poorest paid up to a minimum of 750 for married ordained ministers.

"Has it come to this that the lavmen will allow ministers to tax themselves to pay our debts?" asked Mr: Davis. "The ministers should not have to discuss the matter either in conerence or on their circuits. The laymen should bear the responsibility Two years ago conference agreed on a minimum salary of \$900 for married ordained ministers, Last year only eighty received this minimum. There are sixty-three married ordained men. in addition to lifty-four on the mis said Mr. Davis.
