

HAD ITS TRIAL TRIP

STEAMER THOUSAND ISLANDER MEETS EXPECTATIONS.

She Will Reach Kingston on the 19th—Her Carrying Capacity is One Thousand Passengers.

The new steamer Thousand Islander, built at Toledo, for the Thousand Island Steamboat company, of Kingston, had its trial trip on Tuesday, and Robert Crawford, president of the company, has received the following letter from Frank E. Kirby, marine architect and designer:

Detroit, Mich., June 4th, 1912. Robert Crawford, president Thousand Island Steamboat Co., Kingston, Ont.

Dear Sir—I am pleased to report that the steamer Thousand Islander made a very successful trial run to-day. Her performance fully met our expectations and I am sure you will be pleased with her. Mr. Folger expressed himself delighted. As the run was in the open lake we had no points from which to time her, but she's fast and runs very smooth.

B. W. Folger also wrote Mr. Crawford that the passenger allowance is 1,000, and that there is evidence of stability and satisfactory qualities in the new steamer.

The Thousand Islander will reach Kingston on the 19th, when the people will have a chance of inspecting the finest excursion passenger boat that had ever had its home here. The steamer will be able to make eighteen miles an hour, and this will be good news to excursionists who patronize the long trip to Ogdensburg. The

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of the Vessels in and Out of Harbor.

The steamer Neopawah, passed down on Thursday, on her way from Fort William to Montreal, grain-laden.

The veteran steamer Piermont, is at Folger's wharf, and is being given a fine coat of paint.

A new boiler is being placed in the steambarge Navajo, which is being overhauled, at Richardson's wharf.

The schooner Rock River, loaded with fish, departed for Charlotte, to-day.

The schooners Jessie and Jamieson cleared for Oswego.

M. T. Co's elevator: The tug Emerson arrived from Montreal, with three light barges, and cleared to Montreal with the grain-laden barges; the steamer Winona, from Fort William, discharged 125,000 bushels of oats, and cleared for Sarnia, to load steel rails for Fort William; the steamer Beaveron, arrived this morning from Fort William, and is discharging grain; the steamer Rosemount and barge Ungava, are due to arrive on Saturday morning, with grain; the steamer Rosemount will discharge and return to Fort William, taking the barges Quebec and to be loaded with grain; the barge Ungava will go on to Montreal.

Swift's wharf: Steamer Toronto, down and up; Aletha, down and up; City of Ottawa and Dundurn, up; schooner Keewatin cleared for Oswego for coal; sloop Laura D. is lying at the wharf.

The steamer Jessie Bain, chartered by the Quebec and Ontario Navigation company, started on the Picton-Napanee route Wednesday. The officers are F. W. Bristow, Napanee, captain; W. Jerow, Belleville, mate, and P. Quigley, Kingston, engineer.

The steamer St. Louis, of Perth, which ran an excursion route on the Rideau last year, has been chartered for the Brockville-Battersea Bay route this season.

The fast sailing yacht, Temeraire, formerly owned by the late Major Bruce Carruthers, has been purchased by Dr. D. A. Black, of this city.
