ALCOHOL IS FILLING THE NATION WITH DEGENERATES, SAYS DOCTOR.

Insane and Feeble-minded Increase—Narcotics to Blame for Great Decrease in Birth Rate in Five Years.

Atlantic City, June 7.—“A wave of degeneracy is sweeping the land, and its development threatens the physical vitality of the nation,” declared Dr. T. Alexander MacNicholl, of New York, former surgeon of the New York Red Cross hospital, who was sent abroad by President Roosevelt to investigate the subject of alcoholism and narcotics.

“Within a period of fifty years the population of the United States increased 330 per cent., while the number of insane and feeble-minded increased 950 per cent., according to the recent census, practically all of which is due to the chronic and excessive use of alcohol in one form or another, and narcotics,” he said.

“Degeneracy is shown in the lessened fertility of the nation. In five years the birth rate in the United States fell off thirty-three and one-third per cent. Back of all the cause for this alarming condition, asserted the surgeon, who was addressing the American Medical Society, the study of alcohol and narcotics show that alcohol is the chief degenerative factor.

birth rate in the United States has fallen off thirty-three and one-third per cent. This means the loss of a million babies a year. Let this degeneracy continue at the same rate for another hundred years and there will not be a native-born child five years old in the United States.

“What is the cause of this degeneracy? A hundred different intermediate agencies may contribute to the undoing of the race, but back of them all stands alcohol as the chief degenerative factor. Statistics compiled by the leading insurance companies, and presented by Sir T. R. Whitaker in a report to the British parliament, show that out of every 1,000 deaths among the population at large, 440 are due to alcohol. This would mean a mortality from alcohol in the United States of 680,000 a year.

“The great burden of drink is not borne by the drinker, but by the drinkers' children. The germ cell that is to be evolved into another being is the most highly organized of all the cells in the body. In its protoplasm lies the material and pattern of the perfected organism.

“Should such poison as alcohol lessen the nutrition of the cell or impair the quality of the protoplasmic material and deface the pattern, these shortcomings and defects would be sufficient in the subsequent stages of development. A defective germ cell cannot evolve a normal body; this is the reason that we find a large percentage of functional and organic diseases among the children of drinking parents.

“In our studies among school children in New York city we find that sixty-two per centum are the children of drinking parents, and that ninety-one per centum of these children of drinking parents suffer from some functional or organic disease. In one institution for the treatment of physical defects a recent study shows that every patient is the child of drinking parents.

“Our studies of school children show that one in every three is mentally deficient. If this percentage holds good over the entire country there are seven million children of a school age that are mentally deficient, and less than 67,000 of these are from hereditary alcohol taint.

“Three out of five school children are afflicted with some functional or organic disease. If this percentage holds good there are 13,000,000 children of a school age that are afflicted with functional and organic diseases, and less than two and a half millions of these are free from hereditary alcohol taint. A nation half diseased and half well cannot live, but here we show three-fifths of the rising generation mentally and physically diseased.”

TIGERS AS FOES.

The ordinary Malay house is built on posts from five to seven feet high, but one which I came across was perched high up in a tree. It was the home of a man, his wife and family, and they informed me that it was placed in this unusual situation so as to be out of the way of the numerous tigers which then infested the neighborhood.

As tigers have been known to jump eighteen feet in vertical height, somewhere about twenty feet is considered to be the limit of safety.

The Malayan house is a frail and flimsy structure of sticks tied together with rattan, thatched with palm leaves, and walled with plaited bamboo or, as in this case, with the bark of trees. It is, therefore, an easy matter for a tiger, with its great strength, to break into a house and attack the inhabitants. Many instances of this have been recorded in Malaya.

In one well-known case a whole family were killed except one man, who, climbing up into the roof and thus escaping the notice of the tiger, was a horrified observer of the cruel mauling and ultimate slaughter and devouring of his relatives.

GOOD REASONS ADVANCED
For Removing Duties on Typewriting Machines.

Ottawa, June 7.—W. R. Givens, of Kingston, was the principal spokesman before Premier Borden when the Canadian Press association deputation waited upon him on Thursday, at noon, and in his argument for the removal of duties on typewriting machines said that they are not protective, but for revenue; that they militated against newspaper progress in Canada to a large extent, that they were an unnecessary hardship on the public which was served by the newspapers, and that they were a tax on the intelligence, as the great mass of the people made the newspaper their only reading matter. The request will be given every consideration by the premier.
