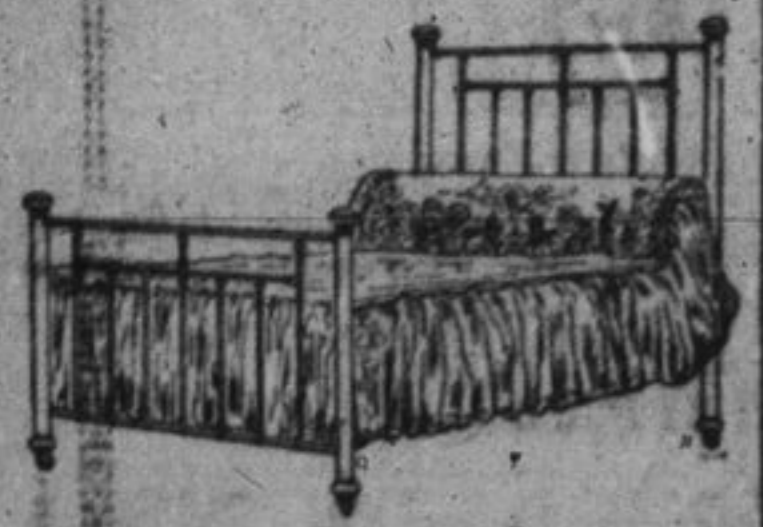

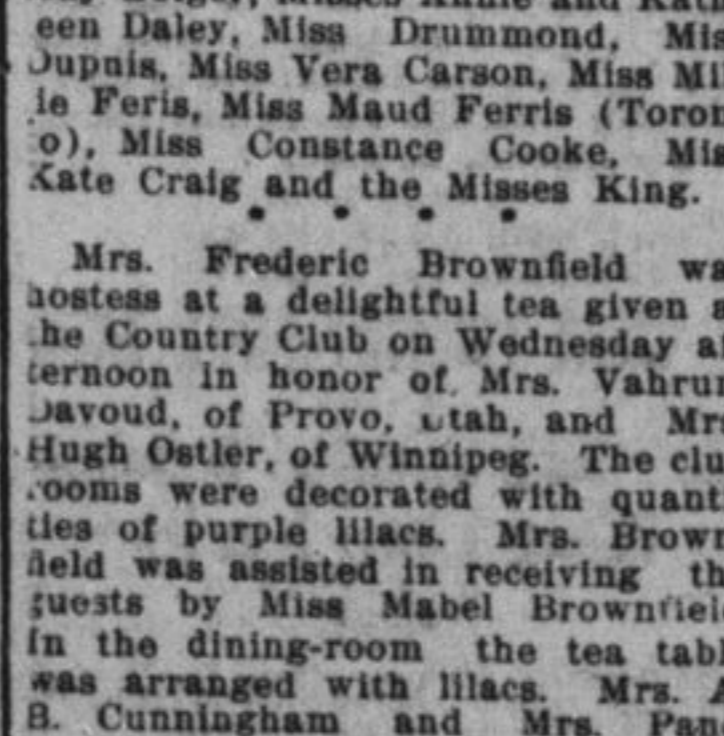
Told In Twilight

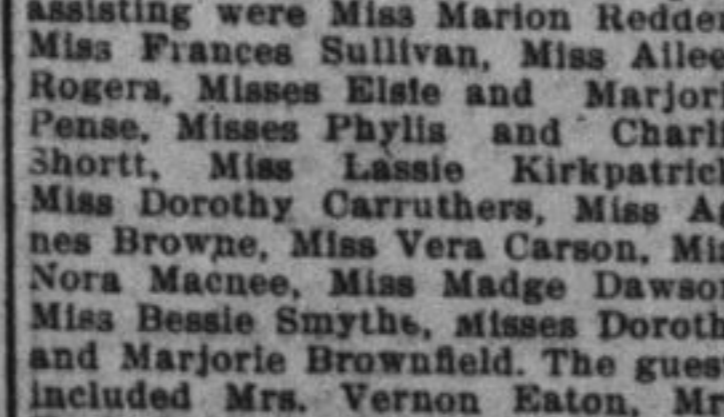

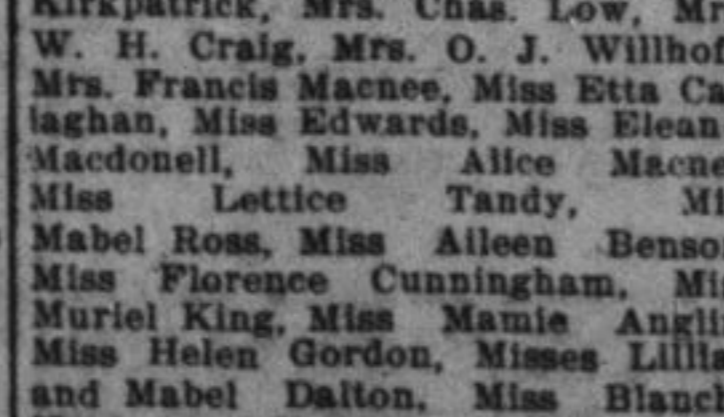
