MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR
Makes Announcements of Interest to Homesteaders.

Regina, Sask., June 11.—In addition to the announcement that the Dominion government would build big elevators at the head of the lakes, Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of the interior, made a number of other important propositions last night at banquet here. He said the government would relieve the settlers of building tax regulations, and reduce the necessary homestead cultivation one-half.

Regarding the naval policy he said: "No wonder that illegitimate propositions of our predecessors in office for naval defence met defeat at the hands of the people of Canada. Too much care and consideration to framing a policy cannot be given. You can be assured that the policy of the Borden government will merit the confidence, endorsement and loyalty of the people of Canada."

PAPER HAD NO RIGHT
To Drag Names of the Dead Into the Mire.

Montreal, June 11.—Argument was concluded this afternoon in the case in which the daughter of the late Father Chiniquy, ex-Roman Catholic priest, is suing the publishers of a Roman Catholic newspaper for damages for attacks on the chastity of her mother, because she married an ex-priest. Justice Greenfield reserved judgment. He intimated, however, his opinion that not even an organ of the Roman Catholic or any other church had the right to drag into the mire the names of dead persons in order to dogmatize on their belief and character.

Reject Duty on Print Paper.
Washington, June 11.—The house voted, 144 to 101, not to accept the amendment to the metal tariff revision bill, which would repeal the Canadian reciprocity pact, and fix a universal duty of 52 a ton on print paper.

The house accepted two senate amendments, reducing the duty on pig iron and on certain alloys. The bill will again go to conference.

Child Poisoned by Quinine.
Lindsay, June 11.—As a result of swallowing fourteen quinine tablets taken from a box left standing on a table, the two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Bruce died before a doctor could be secured.

Mrs. Kingston Dead.
St. John's, June 11.—Mrs. Kingston, widow of the late bishop of Fredericton, died on Monday, aged sixty-two years.

CALL GENERAL STRIKE

OF ALL THE ENGLISH TRANSPORT WORKERS.

Every Port, it is Feared, Will be Affected by the New Turn in the Labor Controversy.

London, Eng., June 11.—The dockers' strike, which has been hanging fire for more than two weeks, took a sensational turn last night, when the executive heads of the Transport Workers' Federation called a general strike of all transport workers.

Every port in England promises to be affected by morning, and there is a possibility of its spreading to France.

The order immediately threatens the local supply of London and other great centres of population. The authorities during the pending strike have furnished armed bodies which guarded all supplies as they were removed from ships to the various markets, but, as the strike was not general throughout this city, even the effort did not call for much show of force.

All avenues of supply will now have to be guarded if the government wishes to continue the supply unhampered. Unless the strike is speedily settled it is feared that all trans-Atlantic shipping will be seriously crippled.

Have Threatened.
Havre, June 11.—The strike of firemen, trimmers and seamen on the France II threatens to involve all the shipping in this harbor. The employees of the France demanded an increase of 86 per cent for firemen and 54 a month for other positions.

The general strike committee has urged them to remain out until their demands are granted. Meanwhile the France is tied up, and her sailing, although threatened, is postponed.

UNITED STATES TO BLAME
Jointly with Britain Over the Titanic Disaster.

London, Eng., June 11.—That United States was jointly to blame with Great Britain for the board of trade regulations which permitted the ill-fated Titanic to go to sea without enough lifeboats, was the statement of Sir Walter Horder, of the marine department of the board of trade before Lord Jersey's enquiry, to-day. Sir Walter declared that the shipping regulations of the board of trade were recognized by both countries by mutual consent.

Strike is a Fizzle.
London, Eng., June 11.—It was estimated, this afternoon, after the reports were received from all over Great Britain that less than one-fifth of the transport workers of Britain had responded to the call of the London dockers for a general strike. The general reason given is that, after just recovering from the coal strike, the workers cannot afford another indefinite lay off, or their families will starve. Labor leaders admit that the alleged general strike is a fizzle.
