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

**THE TRIAL OF CLOUGH**

ACCUSED OF HAVING POISONED STAGE HORSES.

Pleaded "Not Guilty" to Charge When Arraigned in Court of General Sessions Before Judge Madden.

When the court of general sessions opened at the court house, at 9.30 o'clock, on Wednesday morning, the grand jury returned a "true bill" in the seven criminal cases, referred to them by Judge Madden, on Tuesday afternoon. Five cases had to do with the recent escape of the five desperate prisoners from the penitentiary at Waller Collins, another convict charged with stabbing a fellow convict, and George Clough, stage driver, Perth Road, charged with having poisoned three horses, owned by Ernest Babcock, another stage driver, running on the Perth Road, from Stoney's Corner to Kingston.

Following are the charges against the convicts who figured in the sensational escape:

Frank Jones and Vincent McNeil must stand trial on a charge of escape and wounding.

Arthur Donnan and George Brown, escape, bodily harm and assaulting an officer.

Henry Kelly, escape and bodily harm.

A very large crowd was present when the court opened, as it was expected that the case against the convicts would be taken up first. However, the crowd was given a disappointment, the case of George Clough being taken up first.

The following petit jury was sworn in for the Clough case:

Henry Knapp, Pittsburg township; Maitland Lake, Portland township; William McAdoo, jr., Kingston township; Thomas Shannon, Storrington township; G. O. Seale, Pittsburg township; Robert J. Vair, Kingston township; Charles E. Whiteomb, city; Anthony Tryon, city; John McKegney, Kingston township; James E. Price, Olden; Robert J. Snowden, city; J. J. Howe, Hinchinbrooke.

The charge against Clough was that on Feb. 19th, 1912, he did unlawfully destroy, by poisoning, three horses, belonging to Ernest Babcock. He pleaded "not guilty."

J. L. Whiting, attorney, conducted the prosecution, at the opening reviewing the case to the jury, and giving facts brought out at the preliminary hearing of the case.

D. M. McIntyre, K.C., appeared for the accused.

Ernest Babcock was the first witness and he told about having found his horses in convulsions, and about their death, the same story he told before Justice of the Peace George Hunter. He was examined by Mr. Whiting. He told about having the feed box examined, and strychnine being found.

Mr. McIntyre, in his cross-examination, wanted to know when the witness had first suspected Clough of having poisoned the horses.

"When I heard that he had purchased poison," was the reply.

Witness, on being further questioned, said that he had suspected Clough as soon as he found that strychnine had been placed in the feed box.

S. Babcock, father of Ernest Babcock, gave evidence, and told about having watered the horses on the night in question, and afterwards feeling them oats and hay. He afterwards looked the stable door and went into the house. The animals were all right when he left them. Three quarters of an hour later, when he returned to the barn, the horses were in convulsions.

His honor asked the witness the reason for his having suspected that the horses had the poison. Witness stated that he had suspected, on account of strychnine which had been made.

Dr. Nicholls, V.S., who was called to attend the horses, gave evidence, and as Dr. W. T. Connell was absent in Toronto, his evidence given at the preliminary hearing was accepted by consent of counsel. His evidence was to the effect that strychnine had been found in the stomach of one of the horses he had examined, and that traces of strychnine had also been found in the feed box he had examined.

Albert V. Boyd, called, said he was a government detective. In February last he had, in company with Constable Robert Smith, seen Clough. Witness asked Clough about purchasing strychnine. Clough told witness that he had purchased strychnine on two occasions, the first time, a little over a year ago, when he purchased it for Henry Clough, of Inverary, and handed it over to him. The second purchase the accused had made was a short time before the horses were poisoned. This had been purchased to kill rats, but had been returned to the drug store. Witness said he was sure of his statement, as he had asked Clough about it three or four times.

County Constable Robert Smith corroborated the evidence of the detective.

Dr. A. P. Chown, druggist, Kingston, told of purchases of strychnine made at his store by the accused. His first purchase was on January 18th, 1910, when he bought twenty grains; August 17th, 1911, twenty grains; in December, 1911, or January, 1912, twenty grains. The latter sale witness did not record on his book, but he felt certain of the date. The next purchase was on February 17th, 1912, when Clough brought an empty bottle, which had contained strychnine, which witness had sold to him in December or January. On this occasion witness sold Clough fifty cents worth of strychnine.

Witness said that Clough did not sign for this strychnine, when he served it, but that on February 21st he had Clough sign for it.

Henry Johnson told Mr. Whiting that he had a conversation with Clough a year ago last summer. On that occasion Clough had made the remark that he would put Babcock off the road. It he could not do it in one way he would do it in another.

Other witnesses who gave evidence were James Stoney, John Mackenzie, William Corrie and Henry Louka.

The evidence of the prosecution was concluded at noon, when an adjournment was made until two o'clock.

**THE BOARD OF TRADE**

THE CANADIAN HIGHWAYS ASSOCIATION WAS ENDORSED.

Prof. Gill Spoke on the Power Issue—Kingston is not Behind in Price, Alongside Hydro-Electric Service.

The regular monthly meeting of the board of trade was held in the board rooms on Tuesday evening, at eight o'clock, W. B. Givens in the chair.

Members present: Messrs. Carnovsky, Carson, Cunningham, W. B. Dalton, Davis, Donnelly, J. G. Elliott, Fair, W. W. Gibson, Gill, D. A. Givens, W. R. Givens, Hanley, Hoag, F. G. Lockett, L. C. Lockett, C. A. Macpherson, Hugh Macpherson, G. C. Nickle, Polson, Power, Price, Redden, H. E. Richardson, T. J. Rigney, Roney, Sargent, Selby, Skelton, J. S. Smith, Sowards, Dr. J. E. Sparks, Steacy, R. D. Sutherland and Wormwith.

A letter from H. Maxwell Clark, travelling secretary of the Canadian Highway Association, was read, asking the board to support the work of the association. After discussion, it was moved by D. A. Givens, seconded by E. T. Steacy, and resolved: "That the Kingston Board of Trade heartily endorse the work of the Canadian Highway Association in promoting a highway between Toronto and Montreal; that this board urge upon the government of the province of Ontario the favorable recognition of the work of the association; that this board respectfully suggest to the government of the province of Ontario the advisability of having a complete survey of the main highway between Toronto and Montreal made with the object of the improvement thereof to a fixed standard of construction; that a copy of this resolution be sent to the minister of public works of the province."

N. C. Polson, chairman of the house committee, in the absence of Capt. Fraser, chairman of the entertainment committee, stated that the board had been requested to join with the city council in arranging for the entertainment of a party of distinguished visitors, including the minister of railways and canals, who would reach the city, viz. the Rideau canal, on Saturday evening. Mr. Sowards gave some details in connection with this party, including the names of the gentlemen composing same. Mr. Hoag stated that he and Capt. Fraser would take the matter in hand.

The chairman introduced Prof. Gill, of Queen's university, stating that Prof. Gill had very kindly offered to address the board on the subject of "Power for Kingston." Prof. Gill delivered an able and interesting address of over one hour's duration, giving figures showing the prices of power in various municipalities in Western Ontario, and showing that Kingston is getting its power as cheap as anywhere.

Messrs. Davis, Fair, Nickle, Macpherson and Rigney, in response to Prof. Gill's request for enquiries, spoke on the question, and received further information. Upon motion of Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Polson, a cordial vote of thanks to Prof. Gill was passed by the meeting. Prof. Gill thanked the meeting for its appreciation of his address, and stated that if at any time the board should desire to hear from him again regarding the question of power he would be pleased to appear before it.
