KAISERIN OF GERMANY

HAS PROVED TO BE A MODEL HOUSEKEEPER.

Her Ideal is Service—Plans Menus Every Day—Music is Her Favorite Amusement—An Exquisite Needlewoman.

It would be hard to find a more capable housekeeper than the Empress of Germany. Her ideal is service; she has devoted her life to serving her country, her husband, and her children. She believes that this is a woman's highest and only mission, and that women are happy as long as they keep to this ideal. The empress has never interfered in affairs of state, and the dazle of court life has meant little to her. But she has always found joy caring for the comforts of the emperor, looking after her children, and managing her household.

When the kaiser calls for his wife he finds her engaged in the many departments of her household care, in which she is so proficient. Though she does not go into the kitchen and order her groceries and meats as do her subjects, the chief steward comes to her study every morning, and they plan the menus for luncheon and dinner together. She often suggests new dishes, and makes changes in the menus as they are presented. For she keeps many cook books in her study and is always on the lookout for new recipes.

Emperor as a "Recipe Scout."

The emperor, when on his travels, often notices new dishes, and the kaiser, and brings them home to his wife. These she keeps in a large album, and she has her cooks try them from time to time. This is only a small part of her morning's work, for she makes a daily tour of her apartments, and then she has her household affairs to attend to. She is a perfect order. Like most good housekeepers, she looks in the corners for dust, and has been seen running her fingers more than once across a window sill. She keeps a close eye on her maids and butlers to see that they are doing their work thoroughly.

The empress does not believe in foolish extravagance in dressing any more than in conducting her palace. Though her tailored suits and her dinner gowns are made outside, she keeps a dressmaker and hatmaker to see that they are doing her work properly just as she does her part, and she claims that she has no trouble with her maids because she gives them such comfortable, cheerful rooms that they do not care about going out a great deal.

O.K.'s. All the Bills.

She is so thrifty that none of the housekeeping bills are paid without receiving her O.K. She keeps an account book and has it balanced every month. If she finds her bills too large she gives orders to the chefs and others to cut down their expenses. As a girl she was taught to make her own dresses and hats, and continued to do part of her dressmaking for herself when she was first married. But the emperor says that their income is large enough now, so that this is no longer necessary. Occasionally she goes to her closets, which are large rooms filled with wonderful linens, china made in the Berlin porcelain factory, and in Meissen, and with splendid silver services. The table cloths are rolled on wooden rollers to keep them from creasing, and the silver is all numbered and kept in cases. The china is especially beautiful, some of the old Meissen is no longer manufactured, but this fine service is only brought out on state occasions. The silver service is used ordinarily.

Dinner is served at one, and this meal is usually taken with families of their sons and their wives. The courses are generally not more than five and are simple; such typical German dishes as sauerkraut, sauer kraut, and strudles often find a place on the menu. This is a typical menu and a favorite one for a royal informal supper: Curdy-suppe, a soup made of chicken. Rangus-schutte, dish of fish. Ochsenslinden, plain roast beef and gravy. Truffles, cooked in champagne. Torte, almond torte. Artichokes. Ice cream. Butter, cheese, and dessert.

Music Favorite Amusement.

Afternoon tea is always served at five o'clock, and work ceases for the day. In pleasant weather tea is served out of doors, and in winter in one of the smaller reception rooms in the new palace. This is a simple meal of tea, coffee, and coffee cake. When the sons and their wives are home they generally come to afternoon tea, and once in a while invite a few friends.

When dinner is over they retire to the music room, and the time is given over to music. The empress plays the piano and her daughter, who has a lovely voice, delights her father and his guests with German ballads. They are all fond of music and are sorry when it is 10.30 o'clock which is the hour for retiring in this German home.

Though the empress does not consider herself an authority on clothes and their selection, she feels that she is an excellent needlewoman. She does exquisite embroidery and tapestry work. She was taught these things by her mother as a child and has never neglected them since her marriage. She makes most of her gifts, including birthday gifts and Christmas presents. Whatever else she gives her husband on these occasions, they are always accompanied by some handsome piece of work that she has made.

The empress has a fine stock of fowl and cows, and she superintends them herself. One day the emperor was entertaining some royal guests who remarked on his wife's domesticity. The kaiser answered quite frankly: "Because she loves these things she is my ideal. A wise woman looks after her home, her children, and other less fortunate children than hers; she leaves the larger and more serious problems to her husband."

GREWSOME ART. Reduction and Preservation of Human Heads. One of the customs of the Indians that has attracted the attention of civilized people is the reduction of human heads, made by some savage tribes of North Peru and other regions of South America. By means of very strange proceedings they reduce the human head from its natural size to that of four inches or slightly more. When these strange objects were first taken to England, they attracted the attention and curiosity of the scientific world. In 1882, when a head was exhibited in the exposition of London under the suggestive and queer name of "The Head of the Inca." Although this custom is still practiced by the Muzas, Jivaros and other tribes of the same region, yet we know that it has been practiced in Peru for many centuries back. In the most ancient huacra—earthen pottery of Nazca—painted human heads can be seen, with a seam on their lips, exactly similar to that which the Javaros make on the heads they reduce. It is supposed that the custom of reducing human heads as trophies lasted until the pre-Incaic period among the natives of Nazca on account of some divided heads having been found—two complete ones—in the graves of this ancient race. These heads had the face and frontal region, and a part, so that a hair string might pass through it for the purpose of hanging up. The savages made this reduction of human heads in order to show their prowess over their enemies, since they are trophies, and thus the best proof of power and courage is made known by the one who has the largest number of human heads hanging from his neck. The proceedings that the savage uses for reducing the heads are these: After separating the heads from the body they boil it in an infusion of forest plants, known to themselves, so as to soften the bones, which they afterwards remove. When the bones are all out the head is kept in a bawling position and hot pebbles are put inside, which when cold are replaced by other hot ones, until the skin is slowly dried and reduced to the required size. This custom is not only peculiar to the savage tribes of North Peru, but is also that of several regions in the northern part of South America. The Indians of the river Guacuari, in the Orinoco and Negro regions, reduce the whole body and thus a regular sized man becomes a simple puppet fifteen or eighteen inches long. In the British museum there is a reduced head from Venezuela presented by Mr. Fagan, British minister in Caracas. These human trophies are not after all very uncommon, and some specimens can be found in foreign museums in the year 1873 an Englishman, Mr. Bredley, who lived eighteen months among the Jivaros, took with him four specimens to London. Colonel Pedro Portillo brought back from Iquitos, where he was perfect, three reduced heads.
