ASK FOR MORE MONEY

TO GIVE BAND CONCERTS IN THE PARKS.
The 14th Regiment Musicians do Not Care to Give Five Concerts for the Small Sum of \$150.

The 14th band, it is said, may not give any concerts in the parks this summer. The bandmen are objecting because their allowance has been cut down by the city. The city allow each band \$150 for five concerts. This is equal to thirty dollars a concert and if thirty men turn out this is \$1 a man for each concert. The men claim that to turn out two practices and a concert means three whole evenings for one dollar. They feel that the time and money they have spent on their training ought to count for something and the remuneration of one dollar for three nights is rather insufficient.

The city parks committee holds that if the R.C.H.A. band can give the concerts for this price, the 14th ought to. This, however, is not a fair deduction, the 14th bandmen claim, as the R.C.H.A. men are paid to study music and practice music, that their concert money is a side line. The 14th men further claim that they were never as poorly paid as last year, when they did not make a dollar each a concert; and they are not anxious to plunge into such a poor bargain again.
