### Accommodation.

We suffer from the want of a library, suitable draughting room, laboratory, dining hall, accommodation, general lecture room, etc. The covered riding school, to which I have previously referred, is urgently required. A covered skating rink is also badly needed.

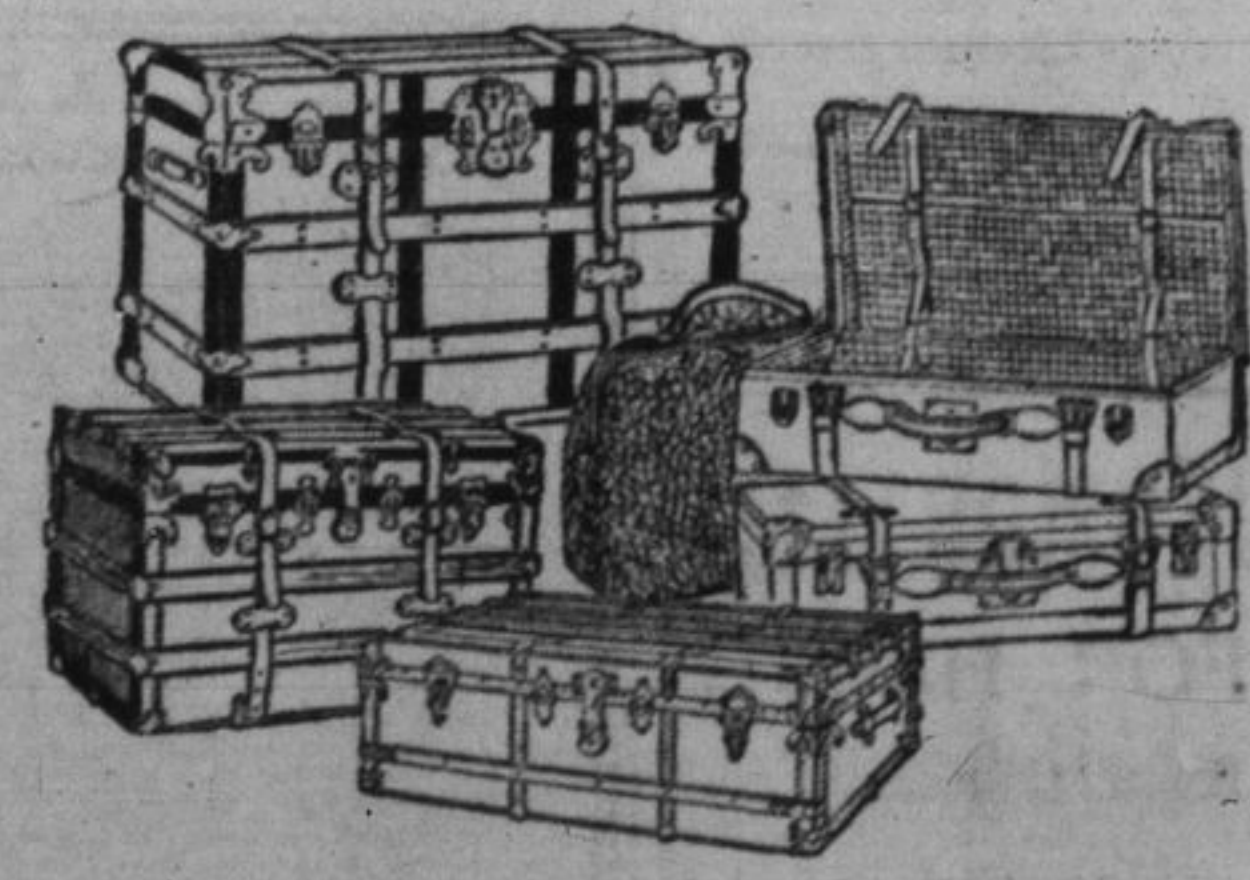
