STILL MORE CHARGES

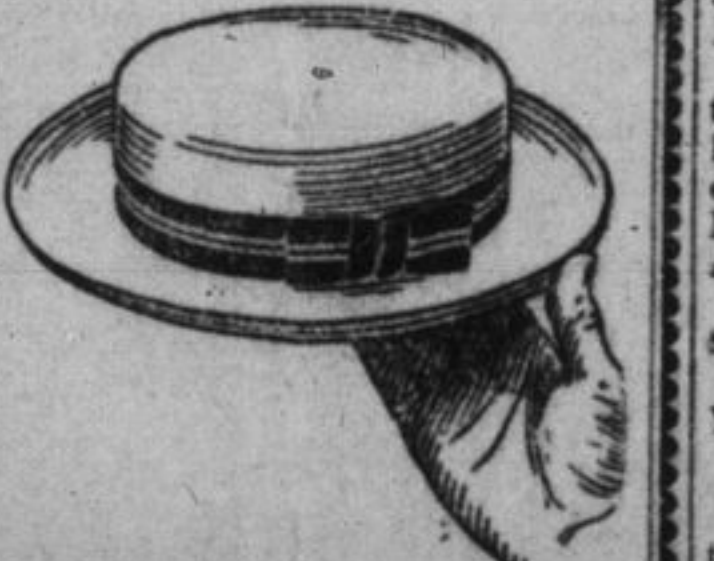
