A VERY FINE STEAMER
THE THOUSAND ISLANDER REACHED PORT WEDNESDAY.
 She is a Fine Craft, and Comes up to the Expectations of Her Builders—An Exciting Event.

The arrival of the new steamer Thousand Islander, recently built for the Thousand Island Steamboat Company by the Toledo Shipbuilding Company, was the cause of unusual stir at the water front yesterday afternoon. She arrived in Kingston at 3.35 o'clock, under the command of Capt. C. H. Kendall, after a most interesting and successful trip. The new boat was built for excursion purposes, being provided not only with a spacious promenade, but also with a hurricane deck, to which passengers have access. The long and neatly furnished cabin provides an unobstructed view to its occupants of an unbroken series of windows extending all around it. Over all the boat is 175 feet long with a 36-foot beam. She draws only seven feet of water and is consequently excellently suited to inland waters. She is a twin screw torpedo stern and is equipped with two five hundred horse-power engines. She is capable of developing a speed of about seventeen miles an hour and has a carrying capacity of one thousand persons.

The trip from Toledo was made by Capt. Kendall with the assistance of a lake pilot. The boat left Toledo at 4.20 a.m. Sunday, with a heavy wind blowing, and arrived at Conneaut, Ohio, at 6.10 p.m.; left Conneaut on Monday morning at 3 a.m. and arrived in Buffalo at 12.35 noon, eastern time. At Buffalo she received her equipment of chairs and benches and laid there over night. She left Buffalo on Tuesday at 3.50 a.m., arriving at Port Colborne at 5.40 a.m. The tedious trip through the Welland canal was not completed until evening and they made Port Colborne at 7 p.m. At 3.05 o'clock on Wednesday morning they cleared for Kingston and arrived safely at 3.35 p.m. The captain and crew were well pleased with the behaviour of the boat and it is thought that she will surpass the expectations of the owners.

The officers in charge on the maiden trip were: Captain, C. H. Kendall; first mate, Capt. Wallace Murdoch, of Clayton; 2nd mate, Capt. J. H. Gould, of Clayton; chief engineer, Barney Farrell, of Clayton; second engineer, John Wicks, of New York, who will transfer to the "Atlantic" and be replaced by Welcome Willocks, of Alexandria Bay; steward, John Tompsett, of New York city, and chief, Andrew Smith, of Toledo, Ohio.

The crew is provided with good airy sleeping apartments, with clothes closets for the officers. The dining-room, which, like the cabin, is neatly furnished and provided with plenty of windows, is at the rear of the boat. The only exciting passage of the trip from Toledo to Kingston was an encounter with a goat at Lock 13, in the Welland canal. Thomas Gallagher, of Kingston, who was along as a guest of the captain, had jumped ashore to take a rope from a pile when his progress was intercepted by a determined little goat. Mr. Gallagher and the goat, after a number of rounds, to the extreme satisfaction of the spectators, became quitted to each other and at last by the use of "rough" language the rope was removed. The goat was owned by a little girl and Captain Kendall tried to persuade her to sell but the goat had friends at Lock 13 who did not wish it to leave and they were obliged to come away without it. Some of the crew, however, got snap shots of the scrap and will keep them as souvenirs of the trip.

PAYMENT HELD UP
 For Automobiles Bought by Federal Ministers.
 Ottawa, June 20.—Two purchases by the government are leading to trouble with the auditor-general. In one case the postmaster-general, Hon. L. F. Pelletier, ordered an automobile "for departmental use." The automobile has been delivered, but the auditor-general has not yet consented to allow payment, on the ground that no funds for such purposes were voted by parliament. In the second case, a new government private car has been added to those already at the service of the ministers. It was built in Dayton by an American firm, and is now ready for delivery. But here again the auditor-general is holding up payment, on the same ground. There are no funds voted. The ministers are all doing much more touring around the country than did the members of the late government, and each naturally wants the unaccustomed luxury of a private car. The necessary money to pay for both the automobile and the private car will probably be provided by governor-general's warrant.

Honeymoon Upon Savage Island.
 San Francisco, June 20.—Shipwrecked and cast upon an island in the South seas, Captain Thomas Edredson, of the schooner G. W. Watson, and his bride, formerly Miss Anna de Lateur, of Pendleton, Ore., who have reached here, spent an unusual honeymoon among the natives.

Upon the island where they landed the couple remained for three weeks when a launch arrived to take them to Tahiti. Miss de Lateur went out alone and joined Captain Edredson at Papeete. There they were married on a sea-going tug to avoid the French law, which stipulates that all proposed marriages shall be advertised for period of one month before the ceremony.

Mr. Milo Recommended.
 Vernon M. Milo, son of Frederick Milo, Johnson street, has been recommended by the conservative executive to fill a vacancy in the post office. Another appointment will take place shortly on account of the promotion of C. G. Shannon, to be deputy-postmaster.

EXHIBIT OF ART WORK
 By Junior Fourth Class Pupils in Central School.
 Miss Laura M. Ryder, teaching the junior fourth class in Central school, is showing some splendid examples of art work produced by her pupils during the past year of school. Miss Ryder did not prepare her pupils especially for the exhibit, but as they had spent one hour a week all year on this work, she took an opportunity a few days ago of going through their books and taking out samples of the work and putting them on exhibit in the class room.

The exhibit consists of samples of color work, the first steps in blending of the primary colors, map-drawing in which the children made use of their color work, oil-cloth and tile design, autumn leaves done in natural colors, exercises in border work, teaching the use of the brush, flowers copied in black and white with ink and brush, several water color paintings and a number of charcoal and pencil drawings, some of which display wonderful ability.

There are also exercises in blending of colors after the fashion of stained glass for windows. Miss Ryder also shows a number of samples of penmanship which prove that the art work is not placed before the writing in the children's work. Miss Ryder says the children are very much pleased to see their work rewarded by the exhibit which they did not expect. She says some of the children are held in school by nothing else than their interest in this work. The pupils range in age from eleven to sixteen years.

BEGINNING OF DELUGE
 FOR THE DRINK TRAFFIC BY N. W. ROWELL.
 View of Middlesex W.C.T.U. in regard to Mr. Rowell's Temperance Campaign—Strong Resolution Adopted.

Stratroy, June 20.—The annual county convention of the Middlesex Women's Christian Temperance Union met here. The following resolutions were adopted by the convention: "Resolved that we are in hearty sympathy with the advanced temperance legislation enacted at the recent session of the Ontario house. We believe these amendments to the liquor law will have a most satisfactory effect in compelling respect for the present law. We are glad that the government has selected as Mr. Aycraft's successor a gentleman who commands the respect and confidence of the temperance people, and that measures are being refused in places that have carried the local option law, but that have been done out of it by some technicality.

"But, having thus cordially professed our thanks for the special account-placed by those now in power, we would remind them and ourselves that our policy is not regulation but prohibition. "To this end we would most heartily endorse the banish-the-bar movement of the Ontario W.C.T.U. which was organized for the abolition of the liquor traffic, and while Mr. Rowell's proposal does not compass our full desires, it comes nearer to doing so than any legislation that has ever been introduced into the Ontario house as a party measure. We do, therefore, sincerely approve and will in all reasonable ways support the effort to enact a law totally prohibiting bar and club licenses, and otherwise surrounding the residue of the traffic, i.e., the shops, with additional safeguards while the shops still remain as now at the mercy of the local option vote of each municipality.

"The opposition leader, Mr. Rowell, expects to open his provincial temperance campaign in London on Monday, July 1st. Because we believe this will be a historic occasion, the beginning of the deluge for the drink trade, and because every society needs the inspiration and education this gathering will afford, we would affectionately urge every union to be represented as fully as possible at this initial rally."

FUNERAL ON WEDNESDAY.
 Remains of Late Mrs. C. E. Britton Taken to Cemetery.
 Gananoque, June 20.—Warden Nelson Webster, Lansdowne, entertained the members of the counties council and a number of friends to a fine trip on the steamer Mississquoi, yesterday, leaving Brockville about 9.30 a.m. and arriving here about 1 p.m. They at once proceeded to the International hotel, where dinner was served. After dinner they did the town until about 4 p.m., when the boat left for the return trip.

The funeral of the late Marian Holland, beloved wife of Robert Charles E. Britton, was held, yesterday afternoon, from the family residence, King street east, St. Chris. church, where, for many years, she had been a most energetic worker. Rev. Walter Cox conducted the funeral service, after which the remains were laid to rest in the family plot at Willow Bank. The funeral was largely attended and the floral tributes numerous and beautiful, attesting to the high esteem in which she was held in this section.

In the surrogate court, before Judge Herbert S. McDonald, yesterday afternoon, the will of the late John Featherstone, of Leeds township, was granted to M. J. Featherstone and W. H. Featherstone the executors named in the will. Probate of the will of the late Hiram Carpenter, of Leeds township, was also granted to his son, Wilbur Carpenter, the executor, named in the will.

The annual examinations for entrance to high schools opened in the Gananoque High School, yesterday afternoon, in charge of Principal R. G. Graham, and Miss A. A. Houston, of G.H.S. staff. There are seventy-three candidates writing, forty-six girls and twenty-seven boys, of which eighteen girls and ten boys are from J. C. Linklater's room in Gananoque public school.

Britton, Toronto, Mr. and Mrs. H. Holland, Toronto, Brockville, and several other out-of-town relatives and friends were in town, yesterday, in attendance at the funeral of the late Mrs. C. E. Britton.
