BRYAN MAY SQUEEZE IN

AS THE DEMOCRATIC PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE.

He Will Try and Prevent Judge Parker From Being Chairman—Resolution to Colonize Negroes in Africa or Philippines.

Baltimore, Md., June 21.—One of the greatest fights of the democratic convention, to assemble here next week, will be that of William Jennings Bryan to prevent Judge Parker being elected permanent chairman of the convention. Bryan is known to be taking a bigger hand at bossing things than many democrats like to admit. He is in long-distance conversation every day from Chicago, where he is working as staff correspondent for several papers at the republican convention. Some delegates, already here, freely predict that Bryan will squeeze in for the fourth nomination for the presidency.

Senator Newlands, of Nevada, will urge at this convention a policy of franchising all negroes in the United States, and providing for their colonization in Africa or the Philippines.

NEW BRUNSWICK ELECTIONS.

The Government Was Sustained by Sweeping Majority.

St. John, N.B., June 21.—The provincial elections yesterday resulted in practically a clean sweep for the government, only two opposition men, Dugal and Pelletier, in Madawaska, being elected. In Northumberland where three independent conservatives ran on the government ticket, two of them were elected. In St. John city, York and Sunbury counties the opposition candidates lost their deposits. A. B. Copp, the opposition leader, was badly defeated in Westmorland. Premier Fleming headed the poll in Carleton.

The result of the polling gives: Government, 40 seats; independents, 2; opposition, 2.

The opposition had twelve seats at dissolution. The Gloucester polling takes place Monday.

PREMIER BACK IN OTTAWA.

No Success to Chairman Mabey Till September.

Ottawa, June 21.—Premier Borden returned to the city, to-day, from Nova Scotia, looking much better for his brief holiday, despite the trouble which he had with job hunters in Halifax. There are a whole lot of things to be decided before Premier Borden leaves for London. There is no indication that the appointment of a successor to Chairman Mabey will be made until September.

"Cop" Faints When Vaccinated.

New York, June 21.—Vaccinators of the department of health "scratched" 118 probationary "cops," yesterday morning, and one of them—more than six feet tall and built like a Hercules—fainted when it came to his turn, crumpling in a heap at the sight of the abrasion of his skin. Many babies in their mothers' arms submitted to the ordeal with just a whimper. It is not unusual for grown-ups to display more agitation than children when being vaccinated at the department offices, but there has been only one other occasion when a policeman fainted. That was two years ago, and he was also a big man.

Claim Both Were Responsible.

London, Eng., June 21.—That J. Bruce Ismay, managing director, and Captain Smith, commander of the ill-fated Titanic, were equally responsible for the disaster, and that it was due directly to bad seamanship, was the opening statement to-day of George P. Scanlon, M.P., counsel for the seaman's and fireman's union in addressing Lord Mersey during the argument at the investigation.

Death Penalty For Assault.

Richmond, Va., June 21.—For the first time in fifty years the death penalty was exacted this morning for burglary and assault in the case of "Bird" Johnson, a negro. Another negro was also electrocuted for murder.

Steamer Burns on Danube.

Budapest, June 21.—A Hungarian river steamer has been burned off Carnavoda, on the lower Danube. Twenty-three passengers are missing, and it is feared that they are dead. Two of the crew were burned to death while fifty-seven persons were rescued.

THE TRADE OF CANADA

May Exceed the Billion Dollar Mark This Year.

Ottawa, June 21.—At the rate of increase in the trade of Canada maintained since the beginning of the present fiscal year, the total trade of the Dominion for the full year will considerably pass the billion-dollar mark. For April, the imports increased by over \$13,000,000 and exports by nearly \$3,000,000. The complete figures for May are not yet available, but the increase for that month and for the present month to date has been about the same in proportion. This means an increase of approximately \$200,000,000 for the twelve months. The total trade of the Dominion for the last fiscal year was little over \$862,000,000. The current year promises to pass the billion-dollar mark and the rapid development of the country, the finance department reports an increase in revenue for the first two months of the fiscal year totalling a little over \$5,000,000.

MAKING RAPID HEADWAY

in Repairing the Damage to Lock 22, Welland Canal.

St. Catharines, June 21.—Superintending Engineer Sullivan of the Welland canal, is still on the scene of the haster at lock twenty-two, and the work of repairing is going on rapidly. Already new lock gates are in position, but it will require considerable time to swing and mitre them and navigation will not be resumed till, to-night or perhaps to-morrow morning. So far, all efforts to recover the bodies of the three little boys, who were innocent victims of the mishap, have been unavailing.

The Y.M.C.A. is to have a camp for its senior members to "stop over to-night" in, commencing the first week in July. A meeting was held Thursday evening of some of those interested, and the arrangements were made. Any wishing to join the "bunch" will communicate with the general secretary. Bishop's Pupils Successful.

At a meeting of the shareholders of Bishop's College School Association, held in Montreal, it was announced that all the boys entered from the school at Lennoxville (six in number) had successfully passed the entrance examinations for admission to the Royal Military College, Kingston. Harold Greenwood, the head boy of the school, was fourth on the list. Ivan Hildwell was formerly the head of this school.

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AN AWARD OF \$3,000

AND SCATHING DENUNCIATION OF CATHOLIC EDITOR

For Slandering the Daughter of the Late Father Chiniquy—Justice Greenfields Said no Church Could Over-ride Laws of the Land.

Montreal, June 21.—A verdict for \$3,000 damages and a scathing denunciation of the slanderous statements, were given, this morning, by Justice Greenfields, against Joseph Begin, editor of the Roman Catholic Weekly La Croix, in favor of Madame Rebecca Morin, daughter of the late ex-priest, Father Chiniquy, following the publication of an article in La Croix, stating Father Chiniquy's marriage was illegal, because he once took vows of celibacy and that his offspring, therefore, were illegitimate. In giving judgment in a crowded court room, Justice Greenfields remarked that no church, however powerful, had the right to over-ride the law of the land. He also called attention to the laws of France and Quebec, which gave children the right to secure damages for slanders spoken to their parents. Editor Begin will likely appeal.

FAVOR BAR ABOLITION.

Good Templars Approve of Lowering the Standard.

St. Catharines, June 21.—The fifty-ninth annual meeting of the grand lodge of Good Templars of Ontario concluded in the Knights of St. John of Malta hall, Queen street, yesterday. There are thirty-six lodges in the province with a total membership of 1,282 most of them represented.

A resolution was passed and unanimously approved of concurring with the attitude of the leader of the opposition, re abolition of bar-rooms and also that of the provincial premier in his stand on the anti-treating question. At the afternoon session, Rev. Benjamin Spence, Toronto, gave a rousing address on drink consumption in this country. Ottawa was chosen as next place of meeting, when the grand lodge will celebrate its diamond jubilee.

Late George Gibson, Inverary.

Inverary, June 20.—On Sunday, George Gibson, for years a much respected resident of this place, suddenly passed away. For about three weeks he had been suffering from an attack of pleurisy and typhoid fever, but was thought to be out of danger. In fact the nurse was preparing to leave for her home, when he suddenly collapsed and passed away before medical help arrived. The funeral, which took place on Tuesday, was the largest seen in this section for years, the cortege reaching from the house to the Methodist church, where the service was conducted by Rev. Messrs. Churchill and Hammond. The beautiful casket was covered with floral offerings, gifts of the deceased's many friends. Twenty-five years ago deceased was married to Mary Hanley, who, with four children, is left to mourn. In Mr. Gibson's death the community loses a good citizen and his wife and family a kind, indulgent husband and father.
