A SAD CASE IN COURT

A YOUNG COUPLE HAD SOME TROUBLE AND PARTED.

Relatives Had Lively Till in Police Court Room Over Possession of Child—Husband Will Have to Pay \$4 a Week.

Sad, indeed, was the picture presented before Magistrate Farrell, at a special session of the police court, on Friday afternoon. The case had to do with a young couple, the husband having been arraigned on a charge of non-support. While the two wrangled over the case, their four-year-old daughter, a bright little miss, with dark eyes, watched the proceedings, but, of course, too young to understand what it all meant. The little tot smiled at the court officials, but was brought to tears, near the close of the case, when a lively fight occurred, and all over her. The child was sitting with one of the husband's near-relatives, and in going out of the court room, the mother of the wife, interested in the case, endeavored to secure possession of the child.

"Give me that child, you shall not have her," she cried out, but the relative, a woman, would not give the child over, and then the two indulged in a little tug-of-war match, for a minute or two, with the child between them, and court constables had to take a hand in the matter.

In the end, the child was restored to her mother, and remained with her mother until the case was over, and afterwards, as well as the magistrate disposed of the case by deciding that the husband must pay \$4 per week for the support of the wife and child, and that the mother should have the custody of the child.

The wife claimed that her husband had left her, while he, in his story, claimed just the opposite. He also had a complaint to make about her being very extravagant; that he could not make ends meet.

As is usual in such cases, there was a great deal of cross firing, but when all the evidence had been taken, the magistrate made it plain that "hubby" was responsible for the keep of his wife and child. He said that there was no reason why the two should not "make up," and he adjourned the court for a few minutes, in order to give the wife and husband time to come to an understanding. The husband had a consultation with his counsel, but would not consent to live with his wife again. His wife said she was willing to live with him, if he would let her all right.

The magistrate thereupon ordered the husband to pay to the chief of police, every week, dating from July 1st, the sum of \$4, said sum to be given to his wife for her support and that of her child. The wife has been working, but at the present time has no situation.

In the evidence, it was alleged that the wife burned her marriage certificate, and gave back her wedding ring.
